## Big League Baseball Gets Away To Good Start

**BROOKLYN WON  
FROM PHILADELPHIA  
IN SPECIAL GAME**

**Meyer's Error in First Inning Let  
Superbas' Win--Opening Cere-  
monies Were Impressive**

Brooklyn, N. Y., April 9—Brooklyn beat Philadelphia in the special opening game of the National League season which marked the formal occupation of Ebbetsfield today. The cold, raw wind, kept the attendance down but did not affect the players who put up a brilliant battle. Both Seaton and Rucker pitched brilliant ball the former just heading the noted southpaw in a one to nothing shut out.

Benny Meyer the recruit from Buffalo, lost the game for Rucker in the first inning. With one out, Knabe doubled to right, Meyer muffed Lobert's foul in the sun field but Stengel overcame this error by making a sensational catch of a long fly from the same batter. Then Meyer muffed Magee's fly letting Knabe in with the only run of the contest. Stengel added further to his reputation by grabbing Dolan's single and cutting off Magee by a great throw to the plate. Neither side was able to score thereafter. Rucker was taken out in the eighth when with one out, Fisher and Miller made scratch hits and Callahan was sent in as a pinch hitter. The little substitute from Elmira forced Miller and Stengel was out on a corking stop by Dolan. This was Brooklyn's best chance to score. Regan pitched the last inning and showed good form.

The opening ceremonies were impressive, the two teams parading across the field headed by a band and Borough President Alfred E. Steers threw out the first ball. Box score:

**Eight Games Played in National and American League This Afternoon--Deals and Trades Have Been Few in Number--Change Among Managers**

New York, April 10—In eight leading cities of the country this afternoon the umpire shouts "Play" and sixteen major league baseball teams begin a campaign which will last until October 5. Eight of the teams are fighting for the National League pennant and the other eight for the championship of the American League.

Everywhere it is being predicted that this is to be the greatest season that organized baseball has known. For weeks the fans have been waiting for the bell to ring. The early reports from the training camps, the exhibition games played on the road and the interleague series have sharpened the appetites of the enthusiasts and put them on edge in anticipation of the start of the pennant races.

#### FEW CHANGES

There have been few important changes in the personnel of the team since the close of last season. Important trades and deals such as have been common in the past were comparatively few in number the past winter, so that all of the clubs start the season with practically all of their veteran players answering the roll call.

#### NEW MANAGERS

There have been several important changes in the managements. Only one such has taken place in the American League but this was a change of unusual importance. Frank Chance one of the most prominent players

of his day and for the past eight years the successful manager of the Chicago Nationals, has taken charge of the New York Americans and expects to have the Highlanders finish near the front of the race this year.

Owner Murphy has engaged Johnny Evers to pilot the Cubs in place of Chance. Joe Tinker the star backstop of the Cubs for eleven years, has succeeded Hank O'Day as manager of the Cincinnati Reds. Miller Huggins has taken the place of Roger Bresnahan as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals and Bresnahan has gone to the Cubs as a catcher. Still another change in the managerial forces of the National League is the return of the veteran George Stallings, who formerly managed teams in Detroit and New York and last season was in charge at Buffalo. Stallings has been signed as manager by the Boston club and will endeavor to put the Braves into the race.

In the National League the opening games are scheduled as follows: Brooklyn at Philadelphia, Pittsburgh at Cincinnati, St. Louis at Chicago and Boston at New York.

In the opening games in the American League Chicago plays at Cleveland, Detroit at St. Louis, Philadelphia at Washington and New York at Washington.

The schedules of the two big leagues have been arranged so that there will be the minimum of conflicting dates. Each organization will play a season of 154 games and the final contest in each will be played October 5.

### ST. JOHN BOXER GOING TO BOSTON TOURNAMENT

St. John, April 9—Tom Barrett, a local boxer who has made such a good showing in boxing exhibitions here is planning on going to Boston to take part in the amateur boxing championships there during the first week in May. Barrett has shown skill with the gloves and it is expected that he will make a good showing. J. T. Power will accompany Barrett as his manager and trainer and several followers of the sport have expressed their intentions of going to see the matches.

Empire Direct, the half brother to Joe Patchen, II, is likely to be one of the pacing sensations of the season.

L. E. Fletcher has twenty head in training at the Pittsburgh track. Merry Widow, 2.03½ has been bred to Joe Patchen II, 2.03½.

W. J. Snow is at the Jewettville covered track with a dozen head. Work on the new half-mile course at Empire City track has started. Signal Boy, 2.14½ has been bought by John R. McCune of Pittsburgh.

Brenda Yorke, 2.04½ has a colt at her side by General Watts, 2.06½. Columbia Fire, 2.04½ is to be raced through the racing Grand this year. Tom Moko, 2.18 who lately trotted 2.10½ was bred by Tommy Murphy.

About the first of May 75 horses will be shipped from Memphis to Cleveland.

The former speedway queen Dodie K., 2.13½ will be bred to Echo Todd, 2.26½.

The Russians are not at all impressed by Billy Buck, 2.03½, and the son of Silent Brook will have to perform brilliantly on the turf to become a popular sire.

The veteran Joe Mooney held the track trotting record at Memphis up to last Tuesday with a mile in 2.17½ behind Russell Allen, 2.15½.

### TY COBB IN TROUBLE AGAIN

Spartanburg, S.C., April 8—Renewing a quarrel which began here last Saturday, Ty Cobb, the well known baseball player, and Rutledge Osborne, a member of the Wofford College team of this city, engaged in a rough and tumble fight in a Greenville hotel bedroom last night.

Osborne came off second best, but asserts tonight that three of Cobb's players held him while Ty kicked him. The friends of the "Georgia Peach" say that Osborne took offence at a fancied insult, refused to accept an apology, insisted on a fight, and that Cobb, in sheer self-defence, took Osborne to the room and gave him a spanking.

Cobb's team of barnstormers played Wofford on Saturday. As Osborne was coaching on the third base line, Cobb, who was pitching, made remarks which, but for the interference of the other players, would have precipitated a fight then and there.

The two men chanced to meet yesterday in Greenville. Taunts were exchanged and according to one rumor, Osborne drew a revolver, which was wrested from him by a bystander, but Osborne denies this.

He says that on pretence of offering him an apology, Cobb took him to a room in the hotel.


