Notice is hereby given that application will be made at the next session of the Legislative Assembly (A. D. 1913) for the passage of an Act to amend the Act 2 George V, Chapter 103, incorporating the St. John River Hydro-Electric Company (a) increasing the bonding privileges from \$3,000,000 to \$4,500,000 (b) enlarging the time by one year for the commencement and completion of the Company's works and for other purposes.

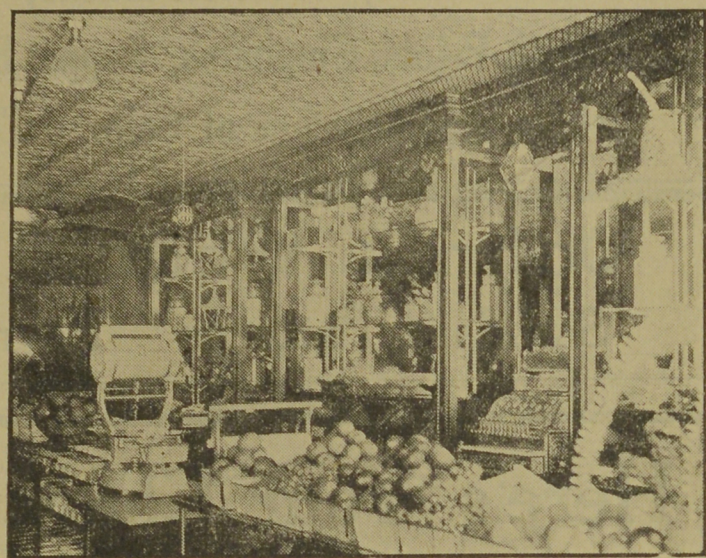

FREDERICTON MUST PAY MORE FOR MODEL SCHOOL

The House met on Wednesday at three o'clock.

Mr. Slipp presented the report of the Corporations Committee.

Mr. Baxter, on behalf of Hon. Mr. Murray, presented the report of the Standing Rules Committee.

Mr. Munro presented the report of the Municipalities Committee.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer presented the report of the Law Committee.

Mr. Pelletier gave notice of enquiry regarding vacant farms of the province.

Mr. Black introduced a bill to empower the town of Sackville to establish a municipal electric lighting and power system and to issue debentures therefor.

Hon. Mr. Flemming moved for the suspension of rules to permit of the introduction of a bill to amend the Act incorporating the Hartland and Miramichi Railway Company.

Hon. Mr. Flemming moved that he be paid for the introduction of a bill to authorize the erection of a sorting boom at the mouth of the Nashwaak as recommended by the corporations committee be refunded the bill having been withdrawn.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer moved the rules of this House referring the bill to enable the Saint John Railway Company to extend its railway lines into Kings County be rescinded and the bill be referred to the Corporations Committee.

Mr. Woods moved that the order for the third reading of the bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Coal, Iron & Clay Company, Ltd., be disregarded and that the bill be referred back to the Committee of the whole House.

The House went into Committee with Mr. Tilley in the chair and agreed to the bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Coal, Iron & Clay Company, Ltd., with amendments.

The House went into Committee with Mr. Culligan in the chair and agreed to the bills to authorize the

town of Grand Falls to issue debentures for the installation of an electric lighting system, and to fix the valuation for assessment upon the Edward Partington Pulp & Paper Co., Ltd., with amendments.

The Committee then considered the bill to amend the act to incorporate the New Brunswick Hydro-Electric Company.

Mr. Carson said that the bill authorized the company to increase its capital stock to \$10,000,000.

Mr. Tilley enquired why it was necessary to increase the capital stock from \$3,000,000 to \$10,000,000.

Mr. Baxter said that the company contemplated large purchases and they desired power to make an increase in their capital stock to an amount that would cover the expenditures. It was provided that the increase in the capital stock would not be made until the approval of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council had been received.

The bill was agreed to with amendments.

The House went into committee with Mr. Robichaud in the chair and went into consideration of a bill establishing a Saint John Sanatorium.

Hon. Mr. Flemming thought that under a general act provision was made that the Province should give a certain amount of assistance to institutions of this kind. That would require that the Province should pay a certain amount per day towards the support of each patient in the institution. That being the case, he thought that a portion of the Board of Commissioners should be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council and suggested that provision be made for the appointment of four commissioners by the Municipality of the City and County of St. John and three by the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council.

Mr. Baxter asked that the section be allowed to stand for the present. He desired to look up the act in aid of local sanatoriums. Possibly its provisions would not apply to this institution which was really for advanced cases of tuberculosis.

The section was allowed to stand for the present.

The bill to provide for the establishment of a Municipal Farm in the City and County of St. John was then considered.

Mr. Grammen supported the bill stating that it was recommended by resolution passed by the Municipal Farm in the City and County of St. John.

Mr. Tilley said that the establishment of a Municipal Prison Farm would necessarily entail considerable expense on the city and County, and it seemed to him that the farm was unnecessary at the present time. The prisoners were now given all the work and exercise they required in what was known as the "chain gang" and just what advantage would be gained by establishing the farm at considerable expense was a matter for this House to decide.

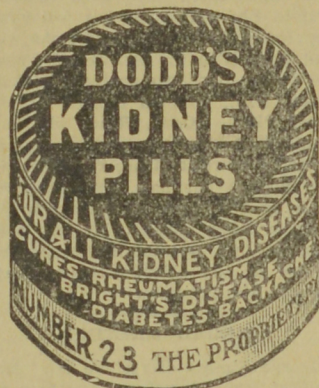
Mr. Lockhart said that he regretted to differ from his Hon. friend in regard to this matter. This bill was introduced as a result of a resolution passed by the County Council of St. John City and County favoring the establishment of a Municipal Farm.

Mr. Carson said that some twelve or fourteen months ago the question of the establishment of a prison farm came up before the Municipal Council for the City and County of St. John and it had been voted down. It presented itself again last fall and was carried with a very small majority. He felt that those favorable to the bill did not take into consideration necessary to equip and maintain such an institution.

Hon. Mr. Wilson agreed with his colleague from St. John, Mr. Tilley, that the establishment of the prison farm would entail a very large expense and that while the municipality of St. John enjoyed a very large revenue he felt sure they would not take advantage of this legislation.

Hon. Mr. Flemming said his experience had been that it was considered quite an easy matter to get a resolution passed but when the question of taxation to meet the expenditure arose, it was a very different matter. If the provisions of this bill were carried into effect there was no possible escape for the County of St. John from expending many thousands of dollars.

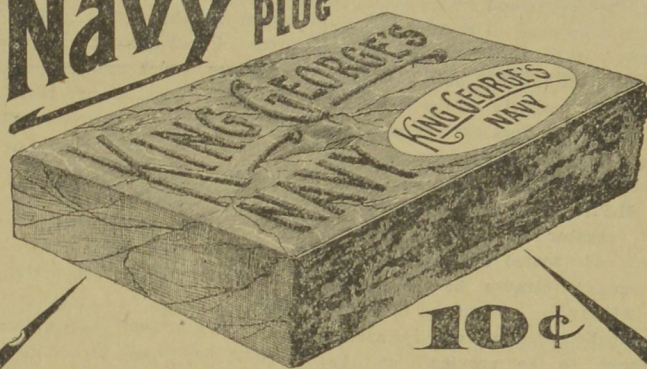
