### OPponents OF NAVY BILL NOT DISLOYAL

London, May 23—The Times after reviewing the naval controversy in the Canadian Commons says:—While public speakers and writers in this country will refrain from interfering with the domestic arguments of the dominions they cannot be natural in the present situation. For our part we shall not conceal our opinion that Premier Borden's speeches have shown a superior and unchallenged grasp of the facts, but we are far from supposing that those whether in Canada or this country who take a different view are less loyal. This point requires to be pressed.

#### INDEFENSIBLE IMPUTATIONS

It is not reasonable to expect that in this matter any more than in the struggle over the reciprocity agreement two years ago strong opinions should not be held and expressed on either side, but British comment on the reciprocity agreement was carried to the further point of questioning the loyalty of those in Canada who thought the agreement sound. Imputations of that nature are an inevitable feature of a domestic party controversy, but, whatever their justification in the narrower sphere, they are indefensible in the broad arena of Imperial affairs and they only do incalculable harm.

#### LIBERALS ARE LOYAL

Nothing we believe has been more keenly felt by Canadian Liberals than the charge of indifference to British unity which was directed against them, not merely by their Canadian opponents but from some quarters in England as well. We trust no such imputations will be heard upon their action today. The tendency of the policy is one thing, the motive another, and Englishmen can think what they please of the argument of either party in Canada without impugning the sentiments of that one with which they happen to disagree.

### 'DEBORAH' DENOUNCED AS IMMORAL

Toronto, May 23—When the morality case against "Deborah," the problem play at the Princess Theatre this week, which is booked for New York next week, came up in court today, there was the largest crowd that ever thronged the police court in the history of Toronto.

For half an hour there was an argument between counsel and presiding magistrate, Col. Denton, as to who should be let in.

The charge was "appearing in an immoral act."

Carlotta Nilsson and her players, through her counsel, Mr. H. H. Dewart, K.C., pleaded not guilty and asked for an adjournment. He did not want ministerial experts called, he said.

Mr. Corley, crown attorney—"I will not call any experts. I just want evidence and I will not allow the performance to go on tonight unless they are acquitted today."

Mr. Dewart said that he wanted British fair play for citizens of the United States.

The Rev. John Coburn took the witness stand after the magistrate ordered the investigation to continue.

Witness started to enunciate his views of the play he saw at the Princess Theatre on Tuesday night.

Counsel objected and the objection was sustained by the magistrate. Witness must say just what happened. He did and while the actresses laughed—vividly and in solemn accents recited the terrible story of "Deborah."

"The play is indecent from beginning to end," said the magistrate heatedly.

"It is a glorification," said the crown attorney.

Mr. Dewart wanted an adjournment.

The police magistrate said "That play must not go on tonight."

"I do not intend to allow it to go on tonight, Your Worship," said the crown attorney.

"It is an immoral play, and I must have bail," said the magistrate.

Adjournment was then made.

#### SEEDS FOR INDIANS

Indian Commissioner N. J. Smith this morning distributed seeds to the Indians of St. Mary's Reserve the Dominion on Government giving the Indians seeds to plant each spring. Seeds and implements to the value of \$225 have been given the Indians at Kingsclear and about \$100 has been spent on fencing.

"I thought it was a quarter," said the salesman, "but I'll look."


