LUTHER McCARTY KILLED IN RING

Sad Accident at Calgary Victoria Day Bout---Coroner's Jury Exonerated Pelkey Yesterday

.333 heavyweight champion of the world, blow delivered by Arthur Pelky, somewhere in the region of the solar plexus, and the end of the battle came after one minute and forty-five seconds of fighting.

There had been one or two o ups of inconsequential character, 0 then came a clinch. Referee Eddie 0 Smith separated the men. 0 squared off in pugilistic attitude.
0 Neither seemed the worse for 'the 0 clinch. Suddenly McCarty was 0 to double up in a crouching attitude 0 To the ?pectators it looked as if his 0 crouch was simply a fighting pose. But he continued to go over, 0 eyes rolling in his head. Then he collapsed and fell full length to the floor of the ring.

The referee, assuming that he had been knocked out, stood over him to count off the fatal seconds. It was the final count for the young champion. Arthur Pelkey, winner of the heavyweight championship at such a heavy cost, stood alongside of his fallen adversary. He could scarcely realize what had happened.

By this time the referee had come alarmed. He called for a doctor, several responding. The Royal Northwest Mounted Police were called in to clear the ring of the crowd, which had swarmed over the ropes. The physicians worked over stricken man for eighty minutes, when they pronounced him dead.
