Pets and Marathons Broke Even in Monday's Games

St. John Won in Morning 9 to 8--Weird Decisions
by Umpire McCann--Three Players Put Out of
Game--Fredericton's Great Ninth Inning Rally--
Bob Ganley Batted in Winning Run in Afternoon
--Game Went Ten Innings--Official Opening

League season got going in Fredericton yesterday under most favorable auspices. The home team won and lost which was better than losing twice but not so pleasing as winning twice. The finely trained athletes of the Fredericton and St. John ball clubs rode to the ball-grounds in state behind the 71st Regt. Band which donated its services for the auspicious occasion and a big crowd of fans was on hand. In the matter of the real formal opening of the season His Worship Mayor W. S. Hooper, the league president, and Hon. H. F. McLeod, performed. His Worship twirled and sent three balls in the general direction of the plate in such a way that the Provincial Secretary could not get within a mile of the sphere with the bat. No big-league mogul is reported yet as being after the Mayor to sign him.

The parade and formal opening took place in the afternoon when about a thousand people attended. At the morning game which through some mix-up had been advertised as an exhibition game—an impossibility between two teams of the same league under organized baseball—the attendance was about five hundred. The spectators got their money's worth at both games. In each they saw the home team put up a great fight in the last inning. In the first everyone was filled with a feeling of righteous indignation against the umpire, Mr. McCann, who made his first appearance in our midst. Without any extra charge the populace saw Umpire McCann chase Catcher Spring of the Fredericton team, Third-baseman O'Brien of St. John and last but not least our own Robt. S. Ganley. The umpire thus upheld the dignity of his office and incidentally handed out a large number of unripe decisions giving the majority of the fans the impression that the home team had been robbed of the game. In short Umpire McCann got in bad, decidedly bad. In the afternoon he worked on the bases Umpire Hanley to whom the Bangor fans paid their compliments last week arbitrating in the matter of balls and strikes and taking the brunt of the kicking.

PITCHER'S GAME

The afternoon game was largely a pitcher's game. Ahearn for Fredericton held St. John to four hits in ten innings and Woodbury in 9-2-3 innings was found by Fredericton for only five. St. John got two runs in the first inning to which they had no proper claim. Catcher Spring of the home team tried to tell Umpire Hanley that what he had called a ball was a foul, having struck Black's bat. Unfortunately for Fredericton while catcher and umpire were having their interesting little dialogue the game was progressing, the progress being that of Messrs. Little and O'Brien around the circuit. These two base-runners took advantage of the ground-rule that on a passed ball which touches the grandstand a base-runner can take as many bases as possible. Apart from an error of judgment by the umpire sharp play could have stopped the scores. Fredericton supported Ahearn without error, while St. John especially in the infield showed weakness at times. The score twice was tied by Fredericton, in the second inning and in the tenth. It was then that the game was won Bob Ganley scoring Flynn with a single to centre-field and making the crowd stand up and yell.

THAT MORNING RALLY

The ninth inning rally was what made the morning game interesting. Up to that time the Marathons had the Pets hopelessly beaten. Gerard had been batted out of the box by Leonard's Reds and Walsh had proven a mystery to Fredericton allowing only two hits up to the ninth. Then things began to happen when everybody thought it was all over but the cheering Hank Callahan started the ball rolling and before Walsh was taken out and Shankey put in Fredericton had scored five runs and made two three baggers, two two-base hits and two singles. With Flynn on third Bob Ganley drove a wicked one over first-base. The ump yelled "Foul-ball" and

then there were doings. Bob regardless of the fact that two players already had been put out of the game rushed at McCann and shoved him around. Police and spectators ran on the field and there was a big mixup which ended in Ganley being put out of the game and in Fredericton's chance to win being lost. Levasseur batted in Ganley's place and struck out. Sullivan singled and scored Flynn but died at first when Callahan died out ending the game.

AFTERNOON GAME

The afternoon game was one that dragged very much yet which made up for the slowness in the excitement of the finish. St. John began the scoring by getting the gift of two runs when Umpire Hanley made a 'punk decision' in the first inning. After that there was no scoring by the visitors until the last inning. Waterhouse was stranded on third in the third inning and Mulligan on the second in the fifth. In the tenth Mulligan went out to Sullivan. Woodbury took a good look at it and a two-bagger resulted. Waterhouse was hit by pitcher and Little singled. Woodbury scored on the hit and St. John took the lead. Waterhouse took too many chances at second and Ahearn caught him there. Little not taking warning ran straight into a putout at the second base. Ahearn to Sullivan to Callahan.

Fredericton overcame the handicap of St. John's two runs in the second two errors by Waterhouse a base on balls and a sacrifice contributing to the result. In the fifth Flynn tried to get home on a long fly to centre-field which Riley dropped but was pinched between third-base and home. In the ninth it looked good for a score after Hank Callahan drove out a three-bagger but he died on third. It was up to somebody in the tenth with St. John leading 3 to 2 and the batting rally as mentioned before did the trick. Marcotte got a base-hit. Spring's three-bagger scored him tying the score. Spring was caught at the plate when Ahearn hit to Nolan. Ahearn was put out on a choice when Flynn hit to Woodbury. Flynn stole second and brought in the winning run on Ganley's single.

MORNING GAME

The morning game saw the Pets playing in listless style for eight innings and then knocking the cover off the ball in the ninth. Incidentally thirteen players were used in this game which may have been why the locals lost. Waterhouse the first batter for St. John started things by being safe on O'Callahan's error. Little's sacrifice sent him to third. O'Brien drew a pass and stole second. Black hit safely and two runs came in but Black was put out trying to go to second on the hit. Bien got a two base hit and scored on Nolan's single. That ended the St. John scoring till the fourth when a base on balls, a sacrifice and an error by O'Callahan let Riley score. In the fifth a single and a base on balls netted another run for the Greeks. The inning was also marked by the departure benchward of our Mr. Spring whose conversational efforts although perfectly well meant were not appreciated by Umpire McCann who was considerably peeved. Desmond caught for the balance of the game. The sixth was Gerard's last inning and St. John took to him so well that they made two more runs as the result of three hits and two passes. Condon pitched three innings for three hits. In the eighth O'Brien was chased for wounding the umpire's feelings by calling him out of his name. In the ninth Waterhouse walloped an offering of Condon for four bases. The home-run also drove in another before it.

Fredericton's side of the game produced nothing startling until the ninth inning which was mentioned in detail before. Bert White in right field pulled off one of the best catches ever seen here but in the infield the boys failed to wake up until it was too late. One run came in in the first on Callahan's error but he was caught between first and second. In the eighth an error, two singles and a pass netted the second run. In the ninth the locals did such things to Mr. Walsh that a hurry call was sent to Shankey who pitched the rest of the inning.

LUTHER McCARTY KILLED IN RING BY ARTHUR PELKEY

Sad Accident at Calgary Victoria Day
Bout—Coroner's Jury Exonerated
Pelkey Yesterday

Calgary, May 24—Luther McCarty, heavyweight champion of the world, died in the ring today from a chance blow delivered by Arthur Pelkey, somewhere in the region of the solar plexus, and the end of the battle came after one minute and forty-five seconds of fighting.

There had been one or two mix-ups of inconsequential character, then came a clinch. Referee Eddie Smith separated the men. Both squared off in pugilistic attitude. Neither seemed the worse for the clinch. Suddenly McCarty was seen to double up in a crouching attitude. To the spectators it looked as if his crouch was simply a fighting pose. But he continued to go over, his eyes rolling in his head. Then he collapsed and fell full length to the floor of the ring.

The referee, assuming that he had been knocked out, stood over him to count off the fatal seconds. It was the final count for the young champion. Arthur Pelkey, winner of the heavyweight championship at such a heavy cost, stood alongside of his fallen adversary. He could scarcely realize what had happened.

By this time the referee had become alarmed. He called for a doctor, several responding. The Royal Northwest Mounted Police were called in to clear the ring of the crowd, which had swarmed over the ropes. The physicians worked over the stricken man for eighty minutes, when they pronounced him dead.

PELKEY EXONERATED

Calgary, Alb., May 26—A coroner's jury tonight, exonerated Pelkey, the prize fighter, whose blow killed Luther McCarty, in the prize ring here, Saturday.
