## SONS OF ENGLAND HEARD INTERESTING SERMON SUNDAY

Islington Lodge Attended Divine Service at Christ-  
church Cathedral Sunday—Rev. E. Hailstone,  
Chaplain of the Lodge, Was the Preacher—Citizen-  
ship and Its Duties Dealt With

The members of Lodge Islington  
Sons of England, attended divine  
service at Christchurch Cathedral on  
Sunday afternoon, the sermon being  
preached by the chaplain of the  
lodge, Rev. E. Hailstone, who this  
week will leave the curacy of the  
Cathedral to take up the duties of  
rector at Hoyt. The sermon Sunday  
was the last to be preached by him  
as curate.

The lodge was played to and from  
the Cathedral by the band of the  
71st York Regt., and made an excel-  
lent appearance. A large number of  
spectators witnessed the parade.

### THE SERMON.

The sermon dealt with the subject  
of citizenship from both an imperial  
and Canadian point of view. It was  
as follows:

St. Matthew 22:21—"Render there-  
fore unto Caesar the things that are  
Caesar's and unto God the things  
that are God's."

I have chosen this text from the  
Gospel read to you as the lesson at  
this service because I think it sums  
up our Lord's conception of perfect  
patriotism.

These words are the answer of the  
Lord to a question put to him by  
his enemies and designed to lay him  
open to a charge of being an unpatri-  
otic son of his nation. Let me re-  
call to your minds the circumstances  
of the Jewish nation at this time.

God's ancient people the Jews, had  
been set apart from all other na-  
tions, in the call by God of the Father  
of their race, Abraham, for the  
purpose of receiving from Him a  
special revelation of his nature and  
had at the same time received the  
mission to witness for Him to the  
world around them.

All through the Old Testament  
times we read of Israel as being  
in the ideal conception of its holiest  
men, a nation separate from other  
nations—a people with God as King  
and inhabiting a land promised by  
God for their own possession.

But in the time of our Lord the  
Jews were governed by another na-  
tion—they were under subjection to  
the great Roman empire, with its  
King Caesar. Not unnaturally it  
chafed the spirits of some of Israel's  
more zealous religious leaders to find  
their nation—God's own chosen peo-  
ple—under the sway of an earthly  
king. Paying tribute to Caesar seem-  
ed like disloyalty to God, who had  
ever been considered, at least in  
theory, to be its one divine ruler  
and king.

And so the plotting enemies of  
Christ bring Him a question to  
which either the answer "Yes" or  
"No" would equally appear treason-  
able. "Is it lawful to give tribute  
unto Caesar or not?" If He says  
"It is lawful" he is open to the  
charge of being disloyal to Jewish  
principles and they could discredit  
His words to the people on that  
score alone. Had He said, "It is  
unlawful to pay these taxes" He  
would have been accused of spread-  
ing sedition against the power in  
authority—the Roman empire.

The Lord perceives their villany  
and by His answer: "Render unto  
Caesar the things which are Caesar's  
and to God the things that are  
God's" shows that perfect patriotism  
consists both in a duty to the world  
and a duty to God.

### TO BE WITNESS.

It is just this that a society such  
as ours—the Sons of England—is  
meant to stand as a witness for. We  
members are banded together to ex-  
hibit in a new and expanding nation  
those qualities of British rule and  
justice that have made the land of  
our forefathers the greatest power  
of administration the world has ever  
seen. We feel that we, in our turn,  
are called to be the fathers of a peo-  
ple that shall be a world power and  
we are assured in our minds that we  
cannot give a richer gift to the Can-  
ada of the future than that of im-  
planting in its midst the British  
character.

### CALL OF CAESAR.

The call of Caesar—to make this  
land of Canada commercially and  
politically a great world power—is  
one that presents itself to us on  
every side and the future greatness  
of the country is proclaimed from  
every public platform and forms the  
topic of conversation in every home  
and at every street corner. The  
possibilities are amazingly stupen-  
dous. The natural mineral and agri-  
cultural wealth of the land has bare-  
ly begun to be harvested as yet. I  
had it on the best authority only  
a day or two ago that of the corn-  
producing land naturally tributary  
to the C.P.R. not more than five

per cent. was yet under cultivation.  
Every year sees a larger flow of im-  
migrants into Canada. From April  
1st to Sept. 1st of last year no fewer  
than 242,000 landed to make their  
home in this land—a number suffi-  
cient to stock thirty cities the size  
of Fredericton. We all believe in the  
material prosperity of the great land  
we live in and we are all willing to  
do our part to make some contribu-  
tion to the commercial greatness of  
this, our country. But this falls  
very far short of true patriotism.  
Our land may show all the signs of  
increasing prosperity that it does,  
there may be no lack of employment;  
great commercial enterprises may be  
springing up on all sides and the  
savings banks be showing largely in-  
creased deposits; fine houses may be  
taking the place of the humbler cot-  
tages of the earlier years of life and  
yet the nation may not have come  
to any true greatness. Something  
more than mere commercial prosper-  
ity is needed to make a nation a  
truly great people. The greatness of  
the Motherland does not depend on  
the fact that her goods can hold the  
market of the world nor that in  
every branch of scientific industry  
Englishmen can be found holding the  
leading positions. No, England's  
greatness is due to the fact that  
wherever the flag of England flies,  
there justice can be obtained and the  
despotic and outcast has the same  
right to freedom as the richest com-  
mercial potentate within her bounds.

### RELIGION AND THE FLAG.

That the English flag has ever been  
the symbol of all that is honorable  
is due, my brothers, to the fact that  
the Englishman's religion and the  
Bible have ever gone hand in hand  
with the Union Jack.

The rendering unto Caesar of the  
things that are Caesar's has not been  
allowed to interfere with the render-  
ing by the English nation unto God  
of the things that are His.

The age in which we live in Canada  
is indeed a commercial age—prosper-  
ity has begun upon a land which  
has lain for countless centuries with  
riches undreamed of hid within her  
bosom. But I confidently believe  
that a new age is dawning—the age  
of the spiritual.

Our patriotism is going to make  
us long for something greater than  
mere wealth of possessions for our  
country. We have to look into the  
far future; to take a long vision.  
We, brethren, are in a great measure  
responsible for the character of the  
nation that shall have the investing  
of the wealth that this nation is now  
accumulating.

### PLACE OF THE BIBLE.

Let us see to it that the fear of  
God is not lost sight of in our midst.  
We talk quite glibly of the Bible as  
being the source of England's great-  
ness, and yet we have not sufficient  
enthusiasm for that most revered  
word of God to make us insist that  
it be taught to our children in our  
schools. If we were only more truly  
patriotic we should rise up before  
our statesmen and say that we will  
not any longer have the religious  
education of our sons and daughters  
shelved. Education for commercial  
purposes we make compulsory be-  
cause we deem it a necessity for our  
nation. Religious training we leave  
to the whim of the individual and to  
the care of the church and other re-  
ligious bodies who have to draw  
their supplies of clergy, and indeed  
their money, mainly from old Eng-  
land. I say it with shame, but with  
no hesitation, that as a nation Can-  
ada is not taking any adequate  
steps to provide for the religious

training of the immigrants she is in-  
viting with such a luring prospect  
of wealth to her shores.

The proportion between the spiri-  
tual and the material has to be bal-

acter. How far the spiritual shall be  
an element in that character is a  
question which must largely be an-  
swered within the next generation.

God has a purpose hid in His heart  
for this Canadian nation—a great  
mission for it to perform in the  
world. Nothing will be so destruc-  
tive of its fulfilling the purpose of  
God for it, as for us to let our  
children grow up in the belief that  
true greatness consists in the num-  
ber of rich material resources that  
either a man or a nation possesses.  
The most despicable characteristic  
this nation has the possibility of  
taking to itself is the love of the  
dollar. Thank God men cannot  
taunt us that that has been an out-  
standing feature of British charac-  
ter.
