## TRAGIC DEATH.

Capt. Samuel Domville, who has for many years conducted a ferry service between Hopewell Cape and Dorchester Cape, was drowned in the Petitcodiac River on Friday night just as he was about to start with his ferry boat to convey a number of passengers across the river. He is supposed to have walked off the wharf in the darkness. He was about seventy years of age. Mr. Edward Cole, who conducted a ferry from the Dorchester side, met death in a similar manner a few years ago.

## MARYSVILLE DAM

WILL NOT BE REBUILT,  
MILLS WILL BE IDLE

Partington Company Not Willing to go  
to Expense of Installing Fishway  
as Ordered by Dominion  
Government

The Partington Pulp & Paper Company has decided not to rebuild the dam across the Nashwaak River at Marysville which furnishes power for the saw mill in that town. This decision means that no lumber will be manufactured at Marysville. It had been expected that a portion of the 14,000,000 feet of logs cut in the Nashwaak River by the company would be manufactured at Marysville in the sawmill and lath-mill. The decision with regard to the dam, however, has killed that expectation.

The dam was seriously damaged by water and ice during the spring freshet this year and repairs were begun as soon as the freshet subsided. Last week notice was served on the Partington Company to the effect that a fishway would have to be provided in the dam to permit salmon to reach the upper waters of the Nashwaak. This notice was served by the Department of Marine and Fisheries, interested parties having called the attention of Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., to the matter. Mr. E. B. Staples, manager at Marysville for the Partington Company stated today that the company did not feel inclined to go to the expense of building a fishway and the dam would be left as it is. "There is room enough there now," said Mr. Staples for the fish to get up-stream."

## POTATO MARKET

SHOWING STEADY  
UPWARD TREND

Local Quotations Now One Dollar Per  
Barrel---Further Increase Expected  
---Price Reported From Wood-  
stock is \$1.20 Per Bbl

The rise in the price of potatoes which began last week as a result of a heavy demand in the United States is continuing. The price per barrel quoted today by local shippers is one dollar, thirty cents higher than the price at which potatoes were being bought during the winter and spring.

It is expected that a further increase will take place shortly but that for the next week the price will remain steady.

At Woodstock the price reported is \$1.20 per barrel, the demand from the United States having the same effect there as here. At Houlton, Mr., the price paid is \$2.25 per barrel.

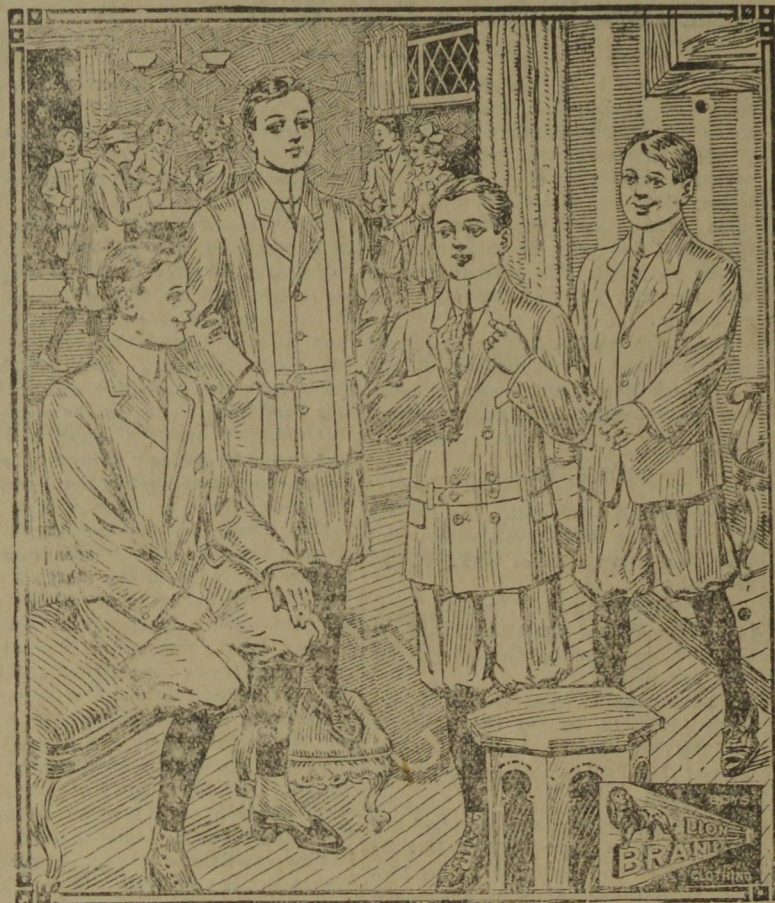

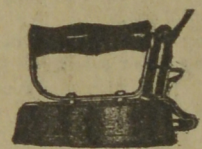
