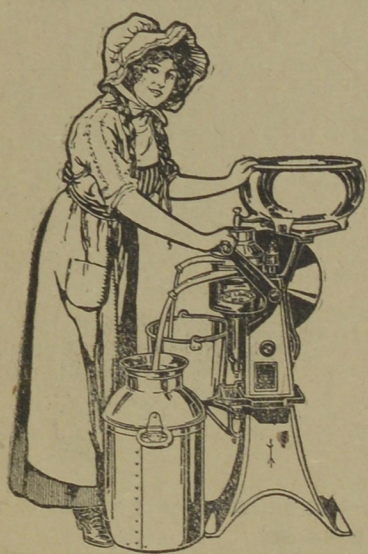

MAY PREVENT

JACK JOHNSON
FROM FIGHTINGAuthorities Say He Must Serve His
Term or be Granted New
TrialChicago, May 16—Jack Johnson,
heavyweight champion of the world,
will not be allowed to fight again
until he has served his prison sen-
tence or has been acquitted in a new
trial, if the government attorneys
can.This announcement came from the
district attorney's office today, fol-
lowing Johnson's statement that he
would fight Luther McCarty of Ne-
braska, white champion of the world,
providing he could get permission
from Judge Carpenter to leave the
jurisdiction of the court, and if
some promoter would offer the neces-
sary inducements.Dist. Attorney James H. Wilkerson
and special assistant Harry Parkin,
who has charge of the prosecution of
the charges against Johnson, today
announced that they would strenu-
ously oppose Johnson leaving the
jurisdiction of Illinois.The negro fighter is anxious to
fight in order to recoup the fortune
that he says has dwindled down to
almost nothing in his battles in the
courts.Johnson's proffer of a fight was im-
mediately transmitted to Billy Mc-
Carney, manager of Luther McCarty,
who is now training in Calgary, Al-
berta, for his match there on May 24
with Arthur Pelky. It didn't take
long to get a reply from McCarty.

GETS BOY RECRUIT
FROM GEORGETOWNLester B. Hennessey of Lynn, Mass.,
Has Made Mark in College
BaseballLynn, May 16—Such glowing re-
ports of the speed of Lester B. Hen-
nessey have been sent to Manager
Jennings of the Detroit Americans,
that when the team visits Boston in
two weeks Hennessey will join the
Tigers. The boy secured permission
today from his father Augustus A.
Hennessey, a Lynn shoe manufacturer
to sign with Detroit.Hennessey is 18 years old and is a
student at Georgetown University.
Four years ago he began playing
baseball with St. John's Prep School
team of Danvers. He played second
base and was the star of the team.
Then he went to Exeter and from
there to Princeton Prep where he
was captain of the team.From the prep team Hennessey
shifted to Lafayette where he played
fullback on the varsity eleven. Some
Philadelphia newspapers placed him
in a class with Wendall of Harvard
as a line plunger.Last fall he entered Georgetown,
but was barred from playing foot-
ball by the one year rule. Big league
scouts have watched the boy this
spring and Manager Jennings sent
an emissary to him and offered him
a contract.

GETS VETERAN PLAYER
FROM DETROITGeorge Mullin Sold to Senators for
\$2,500—Three Times on Champ-
ship TeamDetroit, May 16—Pitcher George
Mullin, in point of service, the oldest
member of the Detroit baseball team,
was sold tonight to the Washington
Americans for \$2,500.Mullin joined the Tigers in 1902, and
three times helped to pitch Detroit in-
to the American League championship.
His showing this Spring has not been
satisfactory to Manager Jennings.Mullin said he was glad to have a
change of scene, and declared he still
could pitch as good as he ever did.

ARTIE SHAFER

LEAVES GIANTS IN
MYSTERIOUS WAYSaid That He Has Given up Profession-
al Baseball—Played Thursday
Against PittsburgNew York, May 16—Considerable
mystery developed today over the
disappearance of Arthur Shafer of
the New York National League Base-
ball Club. Shafer played center field
for the Giants in the game against
Pittsburg at the Polo Grounds yes-
terday, and there was nothing about
his conduct then to attract attention
among his teammates. He appeared
to be in good spirits in the club
dressing room after the game.Shafer failed to report at the
grounds during the forenoon today,
and at game time Manager McGraw
sent Josh Devore to center field in
his place. McGraw said that he had
not heard from Shafer and did not
know why he absented himself or
where he was.There was some trouble regarding
Shafer's contract early this Spring,
and for a time it was reported that
he would retire from professional
baseball and assume charge of an
automobile agency on the Pacific
Coast. He finally reported for prac-
tice at Marlin Springs, Tex., and
has been with the team until today.McGraw has moved Shafer about
several times in efforts to strengthen
the Giants' lineup, but so far as is
known Shafer never expressed dissat-
isfaction regarding McGraw's meth-
ods of handling his players.The club's officials believed tonight
that Shafer has quit the team. Ac-
cording to the players, Shafer had
been morose of late, refusing to con-
verse with them, and was also in-
censed because Manager McGraw last
Saturday removed him to the out-
field, putting Fletcher at short in his
place.Sec. Foster said inquiry made since
Shafer absented himself showed that
the player two weeks ago shipped his
automobile back to his home in Cali-
fornia. Yesterday was pay for the
Giants, and apparently Shafer wait-
ed for this before quitting.While Manager McGraw has reason
to believe Shafer is still in the city,
the player sent no excuse for his con-
duct and in no way communicated
with his club.

BASEBALL INVESTIGATION

WILL BE DROPPED

Washington, May 16—Congressman
Curley today advised Sec. Herman
Nickerson of the Boston National
League club that the resolution of
Congressman Gallagher of Illinois,
providing for an investigation of or-
ganized baseball was buried in the
Committee on Rules beyond hope of
resurrection.Sec. Nickerson requested an opinion
and declared that Pres. James E.
Gaffney was heartily in favor of a
Federal investigation.Mr. Gaffney contends that such an
enquiry by the Government would
result in proving baseball the clean-
est of American sports and prove a
great benefit to the game by disar-
ming criticism of the sport in many
quarters.
