SUGGESTIONS FOR THE COOK

Those children who do not care for rice will like it when served in the form of snow-balls, with a bit of fruit in the middle.

Rice should be boiled soft and then moulded around a stoned peach, a plum or a few berries.

Served in an individual glass dish with a little colored syrup, this is very attractive, and certainly quite inexpensive. A thin custard may be substituted for the syrup. Sometimes left over yolks of eggs can be used up in this way.

Tapioca is the substitute. Cook three or four spoonfuls in water till clear, adding sugar to taste. Then add a cupful of raspberry juice and the juice of one lemon.

Stir well and leave until the mixture begins to thicken. At this stage beat well with a fork and arrange like fluff on a glass dish.

The small oblong sponge cakes make the foundation of Denbigh pudding, although any stale cake may be used. The small cakes are cut through, making top and bottom, and are spread with a sweet preserve. Raspberry is the preferred. The pieces are then placed together

NO PUBLIC HEARINGS**ON U. S. TARIFF BILL**

Washington, May 16—Democratic leaders in the senate were endorsed late today in their determination to refer the Underwood tariff bill to the finance committee for consideration without public hearings. The Penrose-Lafolette amendment directing that public hearings be held was defeated by a vote of 41 to 36 and the motion of Senator Simmons to refer the bill was then passed without a roll call.

Two Democrats, Senator Ransdell and Thornton of Louisiana, voted for the Republican amendment. Senator Poindexter, of Washington, Progressive, voted with the majority. Senator Jones of Washington, Republican, who previously had determined to vote against public hearings, announced just before the roll call that he had changed his mind because the finance sub-committee were giving private hearings to some interest which he thought should be public.

The finance committee will meet next week to hear reports from the sub-committees engaged in consideration of various schedules of the bill, and Chairman Simmons hopes to report the bill to the senate by June 1. Already quite a number of minor changes have been suggested by the subcommittees. These will be considered in the party caucus before the bill is reported.

**STRAY TOPICS FROM
LITTLE OLD NEW YORK**

New York, May 17—According to figures submitted to the Sinking Fund Commission by Controller Prendergast, New York City is the largest holder of real estate within its jurisdiction. It owns 5,500 parcels of property aggregating in value about \$1,300,000,000. The funded debt of the city on Jan. 1 last, according to the Controller was \$1,122,000,000. Deducting from this the value of the securities of the city held in the sinking fund, \$302,000,000 there is left a funded debt of \$820,000,000, as against city owned real estate of \$1,300,000,000 leaving the city an equity of \$480,000,000. This is exclusive of the value of street pavements and sewers and of the valuable equipment of personal property of its various departments. Inventories of these items now being made probably will show that this equipment is worth more than \$40,000,000.

The year book of Trinity Church Parish just issued, gives some interesting figures. The report shows that the assessed valuation of Trinity's productive property upon which taxes are paid is \$15,171,024 an increase of about \$166,924 over the previous year. During the year about \$579,000 was expended on new buildings out of the funds, borrowed or realized from the sale of real estate. Trinity's liability for notes payable has increased about \$600,000 during the year and now amounts to \$3,500,000 incurred mainly for the erection of new buildings and improvements. Trinity now owns 366 houses with accommodations for 882 families, or between 3,000 and 4,000 persons. There are now nearly 9000 communicants reported in the parish and during the year more than 8000 religious services were held. During the year there were 449 baptisms, 446 confirmations, 315 marriages and 302 burials.

Has anyone ever heard of such a thing as a chain of cake? Well, that's the thing the Women's Suffrage Party of Greater New York wants to use as a help success. In its efforts to raise money for the cause, the party is conducting a cake shop at its headquarters at Last Thirty-fourth Street. The cakes sold at the shop are such as "Mother used to bake" as they are quite toothsome, there is a great demand for them. The shop has been doing a thriving business and would have done even more business, if it could have procured enough of these home-made cakes. To remedy this Mrs. Martha Wentworth Suffren, who put the "Suffr" into "Suffrage," conceived the brilliant idea of an endless chain of cake. Every day five of the best cake makers from one of the Assembly Districts in Manhattan and five from a district in Brooklyn will be assigned by the leader of the district to the shop a loaf of cake. This will supply the shop annually with about 3,000 cakes. The women selected for the Sundays of the year will not have to bring cakes but will be let off with a few glasses of home-made preserves.

Three pestiferous boys bent on mischief were investigating things in general at the Erie freight yards in West Orange, N. J., the other day, when they came upon a car the sliding door of which had not been securely fasten-

ed. They pushed open the door, but did not remain in that part of the county very long, for a fierce looking big lion leaped out of the car when the door slid open. In their mad flight the boys spread the news of the lion's escape and in a few minutes the King of beasts had the whole freight yard to himself.

The presence of the lion completely paralyzed all work in the freight yards and the situation became unbearable. A police officer bravely approached within half a mile and from that distance began to fire bullet from his revolver in the direction in which he supposed the lion to be. Finally Pete Amento, a former Mexican cowboy, who lives in West Orange, was appealed to. Armed with a lariat he approached the lion and a shout of delight from the hundreds of spectators went up when he deftly threw the noose over the lion's head, pulled it tight and fastened the end of the lariat to a fence post. While everybody was wondering what would be done next a woman walked into the yard. With quick strides she made straight for the lion who was by that time feeling quite uncomfortable. "Why, old boy, what have they been doing to you," she said to the lion, while she removed the lariat from his neck. Then she led the lion back to the car made him jump in and closed the door on him. The woman was a lion tamer and the lion her pet.

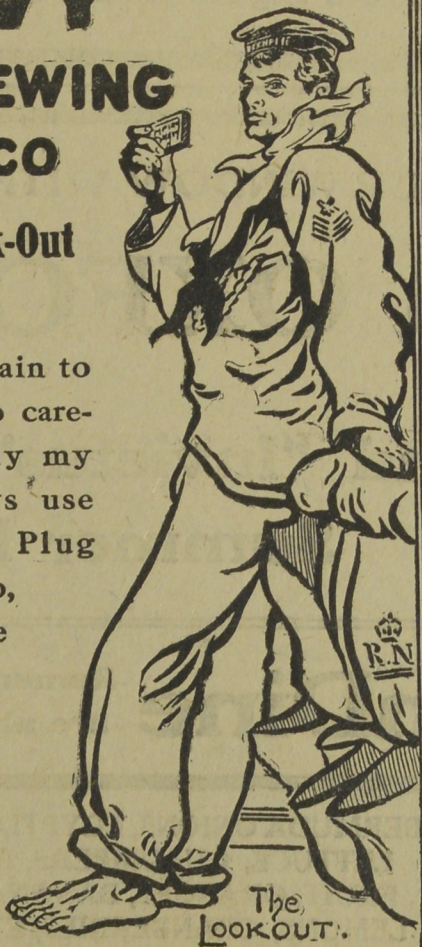
