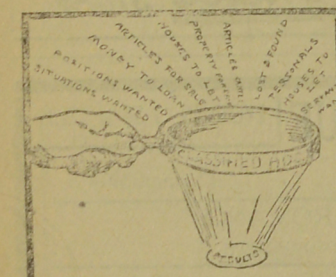

PROVINCE TO CONSTRUCT PERMANENT HIGHWAYS

Bill to Amend the Judicature Act Provides for the Appointment of an Additional Judge—Grant of \$3000 to Cartier Fund

The House met on Tuesday at three o'clock.

Mr. Slipp presented the report of the Corporations Committee.

Mr. Baxter on behalf of Hon. Mr. Murray, presented the report of the Standing Rules Committee.

Mr. Munro presented the report of the Municipalities Committee.

Mr. Dickson (Albert) presented the report of the Committee on Agriculture.

Mr. Parley gave notice of enquiry for Friday next in regard to the report of Farm Settlement Board.

Mr. Dugal gave notice of enquiry regarding New Brunswick Settlement Lands.

Mr. Perley gave notice of enquiry regarding the condition of a farm, whose former owner is now confined in the Provincial Hospital.

Hon. Mr. Flemming moved that the time for the introduction of private bills be extended until Thursday, March 13th.

Hon. Mr. McLeod introduced a bill to amend the acts relating to the Police Commission for the City of Fredericton.

Mr. Melanson introduced a bill relating to the town of Shediac.

Mr. Black presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the act incorporating the Hartland and Miramichi Railway Co.

Hon. Mr. Flemming introduced a bill to amend the Schools Act 1903.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to authorize the town of St. Stephen to issue debentures.

THE CANADA EASTERN

Hon. Mr. Flemming gave notice of motion on Friday, March 14th in regard to the operation of the Canada Eastern Branch of the Intercolonial Railway. He said that the matter was one of very considerable importance to one section of the province at least—the County of Northumberland. The Members for Northumberland felt very much interested in the matter, as it concerned the operation of the Chatham Junction-Blackville section, and thought that the Members of the Legislature might take action to express their approval of the maintenance as heretofore of the whole roads.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to amend the acts respecting the settlement and support of the poor.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to legalize the voters' list for the Parish of Andover, Victoria County, for 1913.

PERMANENT HIGHWAYS.

Hon. Mr. Flemming introduced a bill to provide for the construction of permanent highways in the province. He explained that under the provisions of the bill the government was authorized to appoint a properly qualified engineer or engineers, whose duty it would be to survey, lay off and make plans, profiles and specifications for the construction of permanent highways in the province at such places as he may be directed by the minister of public works. The second section of the bill provides that the minister of public works was authorized to expend \$100,000 annually out of the consolidated revenue fund of the province for the purpose of constructing these permanent highways, while under the third section the engineer or engineers were authorized to enter upon the lands of persons to make surveys required for the construction of these roads. It seemed to him that the action of the government was a step in the right direction. The subject of the highways was one of transcendent importance over any which this Legislature had to deal. It affected all the people of the province, not one particular section, and if hon. members wished to accomplish good for the whole people, they should undertake some plan to bring about better conditions of the highways. This bill provided for permanent work and he felt it would fairly meet the demand that existed today for permanent highways. A proposal had been made that the government should build trunk lines, and it seemed to him that pending the province's reaching the time when such a proposal involving the expenditure of many millions of dollars could be carried out that it was the duty of hon. members to seriously grapple with the problem as it was today and endeavor to effectively meet it. What the province needed to do was to reach the bad spot on the roads and to permanently and effectively deal with it. That was what it was proposed to undertake under the provisions of this legislation. It was a most advanced step that the government was able to expend \$100,000 on permanent work on

the highways in addition to the large assistance for ordinary road work. The large expenditure for permanent work would not be possible out of the province's revenues if the government did not receive assistance along the lines passed by the House of Commons at their last session but unfortunately thrown out by the senate. It was with the expectation that this legislation would again be introduced that such a large amount would be appropriated for permanent work. It seemed to him that the money the province received from the federal treasury for highways properly go towards permanent work and the government proposed, not only to take the amount they would receive from the federal government, but further than that to supplement it with an equal amount from the provincial treasury.

A NEW JUDGE.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to amend the Judicature Act, 1909. He said that he desired to explain the bill briefly to hon. members. It was provided that in future that in order to make the practice of conducting the courts of the province to conform with the other provinces of the Dominion that there should be three divisions of the Supreme Court. The divisions would be: An appeal division with original and appellate jurisdiction, a chancery division with original jurisdiction in civil matters and with such appellate jurisdiction to the single judges thereof as is now or may hereafter be given to such single judges. It was further provided that the appeal division, known as the Court of Appeal, should consist of a chief justice of New Brunswick and two of the judges. The chancery division shall consist of three judges and the judges of the Court of Appeal shall be the judges of the chancery division. The King's bench division shall consist of a chief justice and three other judges. The chief justice of the Court of Appeal shall be styled "Chief Justice of New Brunswick" and shall rank and have precedence over all other judges of the courts of New Brunswick. The chief justice of the King's bench division shall have rank and precedence next after the chief justice of New Brunswick and all the other judges of the Court of Appeal and King's Bench Division shall have rank and precedence among themselves according to their seniority of appointment to their respective offices. The bill also provided for the duties of the respective divisions, where the judges shall reside and contained other provisions necessary in consequence of the change.

The House went into Committee with Mr. Carson in the chair and agreed to the bill to authorize the appointment of a stipendiary or police magistrate and for the erection of a lock-up in the Parish of McAdam York County; also to the bill for the better prevention of conflagrations in the City of St. John with amendments. The bill relating to the town of Edmundston was then considered. Hon. Mr. Flemming said that this bill provided that the town council of Edmundston should have authority to issue debentures for an amount not exceeding \$25,000. The bill was one that hon. members should consider with a large amount of care. The first preamble of the bill stated that the town of Edmundston had

already issued debentures to the amount of \$160,000, but there was no statement as to the assessed valuation of the town. It seemed to him that \$160,000 was a fairly substantial expenditure for a town the size of Edmundston to undertake for a water and lighting system, but the next preamble of the bill stated that the expenditure was not sufficiently large. The third preamble says that the town was obliged to make an overdraft of \$7,000 to complete the system which overdraft was still outstanding against the town. Hon. members should know whether the \$5,000 contained charges that were not fair capital charges, such as the accumulation of interest.

Mr. Dugal explained the expenditures making up the \$152,000, which had already been expended, as well as the items making up the overdraft. He said it was not the intention of the present council to borrow more than \$10,000, but would leave it to the next council to borrow \$15,000, if they desired it. Edmundston had several streets being opened up where the people asked for water and electric light. In addition to that the town engineer deemed it necessary that about \$3,000 should be expended at the town's power station at Green River to insure the ab-

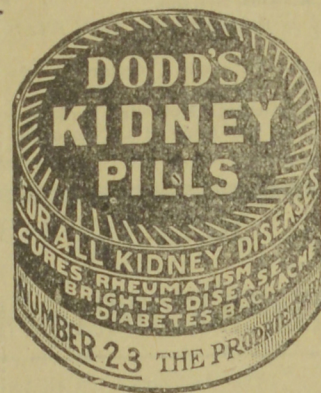

Dr. Clark then turned to Mr. Borden's change of front. He quoted the latter's declaration at Halifax in the fall of 1909.

"Why has he gone back on those words?" Dr. Clark asked. "If he had not we would be unanimous in the House today. But you must remember the Drummond-Arthabaska election. He then made an alliance that is going to be fatal to his administration. According to Mr. Borden you are to be a fully ordained nation on land but you are no good on sea. Why should self-government stop at the seaside? Mr. Borden says there were more desertions from the two Canadian cruisers than there were recruits, but let him remember that he has been the chief deserter from the Canadian navy."

De. Clark argued that the Liberal navy policy was the only one that made for real imperial unity. He repudiated the charges of disloyalty thrown at the Liberals of Canada.

SIR ALLEN COMMENDS CANDIDATE.

Sir Allen Aylesworth was given rousing cheers when he arose to speak.

"You did a good day's work," he said, "in choosing Mr. King as your standard-bearer in any election that may come. When that struggle comes it will be no light contest but is bound to be a strenuous and bitter one."

After paying a high tribute to Mr. King, Sir Allen dealt briefly with the issue of the day.
