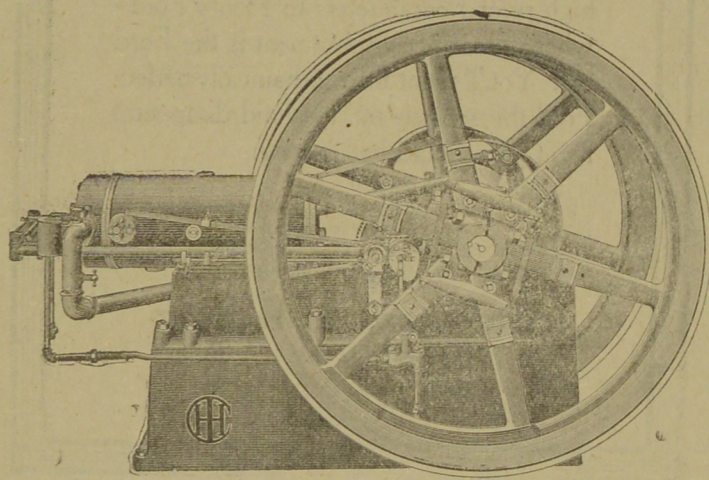

Kalamazoo, Mich., March 10—Claiming that his players lost the Michigan Intercollegiate A.A. baseball championship last year because they "shied" at pitched balls Coach Matner of Kalamazoo College tonight announced he will install a "shackle" batting cage for practice this Spring.

The coach says each batter will have his inside foot chained to a stake, thus forcing him to stand up to the plate and face the pitcher.

OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE WILL RACE TOMORROW

London, March 12—The annual boat race between the crews of Oxford and Cambridge universities will take place tomorrow and interest in the great aquatic event is as keen as ever. The contest, as in previous years, will be rowed over the Thames course from Mortlake to Putney.

Both crews took their final practice spins their morning and the unanimous opinion of the critics was that both crews are superior to those of last year. The odds are slightly in favor of Oxford, though everyone agrees that it is likely to be a close contest. If the water is rough tomorrow the toss of a coin for choice of stations may decide the race.

The race will be the seventieth in the series of annual contests between the Oxford and Cambridge eights. Of the total Oxford has won 38 and Cambridge 30. In 1877 the contest resulted in a dead heat. The best record for the distance (about four and one quarter miles) is 18 minutes 29 seconds, which was made by the Oxford crew two years ago.

INDIVIDUAL BOWLING RECORD WAS BROKEN

At American Bowling Congress at Toledo, William J. Knox of Philadelphia Made Perfect Score

Toledo, O., March 10—All records for an individual game in an American Bowling Congress tournament were smashed tonight by William J. Knox of Philadelphia when he rolled 300, a perfect score. Knox's total count in his individuals was 672, which placed him second in the 10 leaders.

The work of Knox created the biggest sensation of the 13th annual tournament, which is drawing to a close. When he began his rolling tonight he totaled only 173 in his first game. He improved his second game to 199, getting a succession of strikes to the end after the seventh frame.

He continued his strikes in the third game. On his 1st ball one of the pins wavered. Everyone in the hall held his breath. The pin made a few vibrations and fell into the pit, completing the perfect run of 300.

Two score boys on the top tier fell off their stands. Cheers greeted Knox, who was the coolest man in the big hall.

The perfect score made by Knox is the sixth he has made thus far this year, the remainder having been made in league games in Philadelphia.

JEM HALL DYING

Neenah, Wis., March 10—Jem Hall, a former well known pugilist, was found dying of tuberculosis today in a hotel. He is penniless and his once great physique has wasted away until he is hardly recognizable.

Just 20 years ago last Saturday Hall was knocked out in the fourth round by Bob Fitzsimmons at New Orleans for a purse of \$40,000. The State Anti-tuberculosis Society is now caring for him.

SHEEHAN REINSTATED

Cincinnati, March 10—Player Thos. P. Sheehan of the Brooklyn club of the National League, who was promulgated as an ineligible player some time ago because he refused to report to his club, was today reinstated by the National Baseball Commission without the imposition of a fine. Sheehan's application was accompanied by a statement that he intended retiring from baseball, and that the Brooklyn club had engaged to give him his unconditional release.

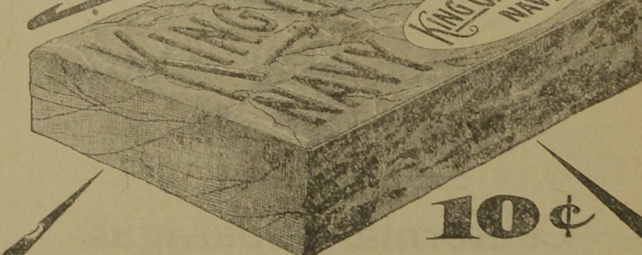
