Bombay, March 11.—Four hundred  
weddings were celebrated simultane-  
ously a few days ago at Surat  
among members of the Lewa Kunbi  
caste. None of the brides were over  
twelve years of age, the majority  
being from five to seven years old,  
while the bride-grooms varied from  
three to nine. Most of the contract-  
ing parties sat or lay on the laps  
of their parents during the ceremony  
and were given sweets to keep them  
quiet. The caste only celebrates  
weddings every ten or twelve years.

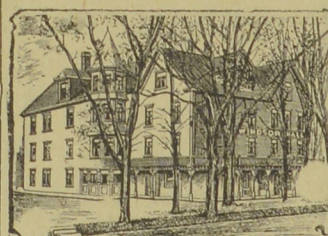
