OPPOSITION TO  
MAYOR AS MEMBER  
POLICE COMMISSION

Committee in Charge of Bill Confirmed With Aldermen Elect Last Night  
---Appointee of City Council Suggested

The bill for the creation of an independent police commission for the City of Fredericton is to have its second reading before the legislature today. The committee which prepared the bill and which is promoting it in the legislature in accordance with an agreement entered into some weeks ago conferred last night with the members of the ticket which opposed and defeated the old City Council in Monday's election. The aldermen-elect considered and discussed the provisions of the bill.

## CHANGE SUGGESTED

It is understood that a change in the composition of the proposed commission is suggested. According to the provisions of the bill the county court judges, the mayor of Fredericton and a commissioner to be appointed by the provincial government are to comprise the commission. It has been suggested that an appointee of the City Council to serve five years would be preferable to the mayor of the city as a commissioner as the mayor might be a different person each year and the making of that official a police commissioner would defeat the aim of the agitation for an independent commission by permitting the choice to one commissioner to remain in civic politics.

The aldermen elected Monday are to be sworn in at four o'clock this afternoon. His Worship administering the oath. Committees and chairmen will be appointed afterward.

INCREASED PRICES  
FOR UPSALQUITCH  
FISHING RIGHTS

Upwards of Three Thousand Dollars Bid for Three Leases at Crown Land Office This Morning---Ten Year Leases

Three salmon-fishing lots on the Upsalquitch stream were sold at public auction at the Crown Land office this morning and brought greatly increased prices, the total price bid being \$3020.00. The upset prices for the lots totalled \$1750.00. The fishing rights on the Upsalquitch were formerly owned by Mr. Thomas Malcolm of the International Railway, who paid \$1600 for them.

## RIGHTS SECURED

The purchasers have secured the exclusive right to fish with rod only in front of the ungranted crown lands on stretches of the Upsalquitch River named in the terms terms for sale. The leases of the fishing rights will be governed by existing regulations and are for a term of ten years from March 1, 1913 and will expire in 1923.

## LOTS AND PRICES

The lots and prices paid are as follows:

1. From mouth of Upsalquitch River to mouth of Boland's Brook, upset price \$600. W. A. Black, \$800.
2. From mouth of Boland's Brook up stream three miles including Caribou Pool, upset price \$150. J. F. Robertson, \$200.
3. From three miles above mouth of Boland's Brook to Forks including first ten miles of the Northwest and Southeast Branches, but excluding their tributaries, upset price \$1000. Ambrose Monell, New York, \$2010.

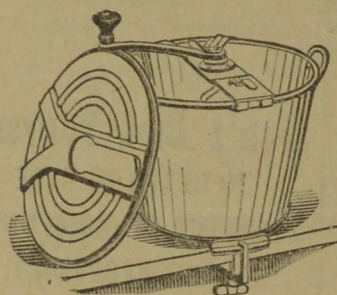
