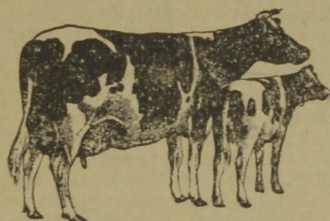

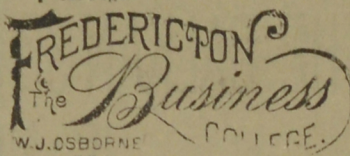

Pittsburgh, Pa., Jan. 23—In both labor and industrial circles much interest is manifested in the hearing which will be begun tomorrow in the quo warrant proceedings started by Alexander P. Moore and others against the company store operated by the Jones and Laughlin Steel Company. The action marks the beginning of a crusade for the abolition of the system of company stores operated generally by mills, mines and factories throughout Pennsylvania. The promoters of the movement to abolish the company stores declare that the system robs the working men and keeps their families in poverty.

The Plumbers' International Union now has 585 locals, an average wage of \$5 a day, and in most cases the locals have an eight-hour day and a Saturday half holiday.

An effort is to be made by organized labor to obtain better pay for post office clerks, and the movement will have the backing of the American Federation of Labor.

SOMETHING ABOUT THE
ASHBURNHAM FAMILY

Marquise de Fontenay contributes to the Halifax Echo, the following concerning the new Earl of Ashburnham, who is among the passengers on board the Grampian, which sailed Monday for Liverpool:

Inasmuch as the Hon. John Ashburnham of the Croft, Crowborough, Sussex, formerly of the English diplomatic service, and one time Consul General and diplomatic agent in Bulgaria, died last May without leaving any issue by his marriage with Miss Maud Dawson, daughter of an Anglo-Indian official, it is Major the Hon. Thomas Ashburnham, third brother of the fifth Lord Ashburnham, who now through the latter's demise, succeeds to the Earldom of Ashburnham, to the Viscounty of St. Asaph, to the other honors, and estates in Suffolk, Sussex and Wales, and to a considerable fortune.

A COMMISSION

Major Ashburnham has for the last twelve years made his home at Fredericton, New Brunswick, where he married in 1903, Miss Maria Anderson, a telephone operator in the employ of the New Brunswick Telephone Company. Formerly a captain of the Seventh Hussar Regiment, with which he served in the Egyptian campaign of 1882, under Lord Wolseley, and aide-de-camp to two Viceroy of Ireland, one of them Lord Aberdeen, (during his former tenure of that office), Thomas Ashburnham accepted a commission as Major of a Canadian militia regiment, the 28th New Brunswick Dragoons, after settling down at Fredericton.

NO CHILDREN

The new Lord Ashburnham, who is a man of nearly sixty, has no children, and in the event of his death without male issue, the family honors will become extinct, while the entailed estates will either be left at the disposal of his widow, or else become the subject of lawsuits on the part of the descendants of the daughters of the fourth Earl of Ashburnham.

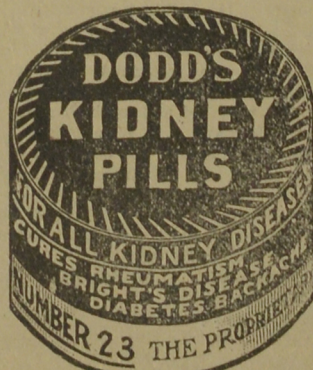
There was little love lost between the new Lord Ashburnham and the late Earl. For only last year the two were engaged in legal proceedings against one another, in connection with the will and estate of another brother, the Hon. George Ashburnham, who died in 1911; and under the circumstances it is quite possible that Lord Ashburnham, a Protestant, may endeavor to revoke the action of the late Earl, a convert to Roman Catholicism, in placing Pembrey, his country seat and park in Carmarthenshire, at the disposal of the Benedictine monks, after their expulsion from their monasteries in Brittany. There is so much resemblance between the Welsh and Breton languages, that the monks, most of them natives of Brittany, found themselves able to converse freely with their Carmarthenshire neighbors, who though nearly all different in faith, welcomed them with the utmost kindness.

AN ONLY DAUGHTER

The late Earl left an only daughter Lady Mary Ashburnham, now twenty-two years of age, who has become a nun, and belongs to the convent of the Sacred Heart, at Roehampton, on the outskirts of London. No one knew of the birth of this daughter until several years after it had taken place, and it had always been supposed that the late Earl was an impetrate bachelor, until the London Times of February 14, 1893, contained an announcement to the effect that "On January 0, 1890, the Countess of Ashburnham gave birth to a daughter." Lower down in the same column, on the first page of the Times, there was an announcement among the marriage notices that "On February 25, 1888, a marriage took place between Bertram, Earl of Ashburnham, and Emily, daughter of Robert Chaplin."

The latter, on investigation, turned out to be a petty tradesman, very respectable, but of humble origin. The Countess lived a very retired life, was altogether unknown to the Great World of London, and even to her husband's relatives. But he was devoted to her, and when she died in 1900, that is to say, after twelve years of happy marriage, he mourned her deeply and sincerely.

NOTICE OF LEGISLATION

The City of Fredericton will present at the approaching Session of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick the following bills for enactment:

(1) A Bill authorizing the City to grant certain concessions to the Palmer-McLellan Company, Limited, and to fix the valuation of the property of Frasers Limited in this City for taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue of Debentures for the erection of a Fire Station, a Police Station, for the purchase of Queen's Park and for the further construction of Permanent Street Pavements, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000).

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting by electricity the Fredericton and St. Mary's Highway Bridge.
