WOULD PUT US ON PAR WITH THE MALAYS

(From the London Advertiser)

As soon as New Zealand carries out her intention of inaugurating her own navy, the only remaining contributory portion of the Empire besides Canada will be Malaysia. The brown people over there are just in the right stage, it seems, for helping by contribution.

Much may be said of the system in their case, if the people in general are willing. They have no representative institutions, no ideas of citizenship. They are tin-miners or engage in the simple labors of producing tapioca, sugar-canes, pepper and rice. Rice and tapioca call up visions of a race kindly and inoffensive, if we didn't know something to the contrary about Malays and Malay fighting cocks. At any rate, we have not heard of Malays setting the engineering or industrial world afire. They are men with the hoe or pickaxe.

Canadians, Mr. Borden takes it, and has persuaded Mr. Churchill, are about on a par with their brown fellow subjects around Singapore. Two years ago Mr. Borden and his friends argued that the Yankee was a superior race, much too sharp for Brother Canuck to risk any dealings with him, and able to beat the Canadian farmer out of his own home market. We are not competent to have a navy much less to build one. We are not fit to govern ourselves. An inferior race, we need somebody's protection, like the Indian or Malay. This is Mr. Borden's confession of faith.

"Who are these Malays anyway?" asks the Toronto Star. Looking up a book one finds them described as "an Oceanic branch of the Mongolic division of mankind, modified by interminglings with Pampuan or Caucasian elements." This is perhaps interesting if not too illuminating. These yellow fellows seem to be like Canadians a nation of mixed strains. Beg pardon, Canada is not and cannot be a nation. It is only an over-flow.

"They (the Malays) are of low size averaging little over five feet, etc." "The Malay intellect is of a low order, and the race has never developed a native culture, their civilization being entirely due to foreign influence. They are subject to fits of frenzy, well known as 'running amok.'"

So the book says. So the poor Canadian also, says Mr. Borden, is of a low order, runs amok over any nothing, can't build or man or run a navy. Australians and New Zealanders may rule the Pacific, they may be non-tributary. Canada with Malaysia must belong to the contributory states of the Empire.

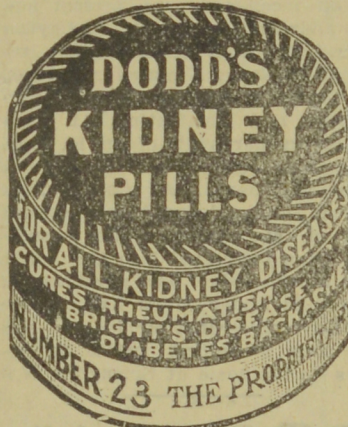
