NO LICENSE LAW FOR SYDNEY N. S.

Halifax, April 10—With the exception of the city of Halifax, Nova Scotia is under prohibition. The system in Halifax is license, but this is subject to change after a plebiscite. Should this plebiscite be in favor of prohibition for Halifax then the prohibition law would be.

Sydney is the only other municipality made applicable also to the capital, in the province holding the rank of a city. A bill has been before the legislature for some time proposing to put Sydney on a license footing, similarly to Halifax, but today this was given the three months' hoist.

This action was taken in face of the fact that Sydney some time ago held a plebiscite which resulted about 960 to 230 in favor of license and that the city council is 8 to 3 in favor of license.

PRACTISING LAW IN ALBERTA.

Mr. Francis M. O'Neill, L.L.B., son of Ex-Ald. Hugh O'Neill of this city, has been admitted to the bar of the Province of Alberta. A recent issue of The Albertan of Calgary, states that Mr. O'Neill will open an office at Medicine Hat. He is taking part in the provincial election in Alberta being on the stump for Hon. Charles Mitchell, member of the Liberal government who is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick. Mr. J. Stewart Mavor, son of Mr. John Mavor, who is practising law at Bassano, is speaking in the Conservative interest in the Bow River district.

CREATED DISTURBANCE.

A young man belonging to the city was fined two dollars by the police magistrate this morning for creating a disturbance near W. A. Lindsay's restaurant, King street, last night. Some soldiers who also were concerned in the matter were chased into the barracks by the police and will be attended to by the military authorities.

Daniel McDade of McAdam was charged before the police court yesterday afternoon with a second offense against the Canada Temperance Act. The case is postponed for a week in order to obtain a certificate of a previous conviction against the Act. A conviction will be made.

WIDOW OF SIR JOHN THOMPSON

Toronto, April 10—Lady Annie E. Thompson, widow of Sir John Thompson, who was premier of Canada from December, 1892 to December 1894, died today at the general hospital following an operation.

Lady Thompson has resided in Toronto practically continuously since the death of her husband in Windsor Castle, Dec. 12, 1894.

Born in Halifax, N. S., Lady Thompson was educated there. On her husband's death a fund was raised for her benefit to which the parliament of Canada contributed \$25,000.

As a founder of the National Council of Women of Canada, she was at one time dominion president and took an active interest in its undertakings. John Thompson arrived from Ottawa on Wednesday and was at the bedside when the end came.

SUEING OWNERS OF MARYSVILLE PROPERTY

Boston, April 10—Alleging a breach of agreement, Alfred L. Sweeney of Boston, has brought suit in the Superior Court against Nathaniel M. Jones and Harry W. Schofield, both of St. John, E.B., and Edward Partington of Glossup, Eng., for \$200,000 damages.

Sweeney alleges he owned substantially all the stock of the Alexander Gibson Railway & Manufacturing Company of New Brunswick, which had timber and water rights, franchise, mills and other buildings. He alleges Jones and Schofield arranged to buy the property and told him they were to resell it. The equities were largely in excess of the mortgages on the property, according to the plaintiff.

Sweeney further alleges Schofield and Jones induced Partington to acquire the property through foreclosure in violation of the agreement between them and that they received from Partington more than \$200,000 in excess of the amount they agreed to pay him.

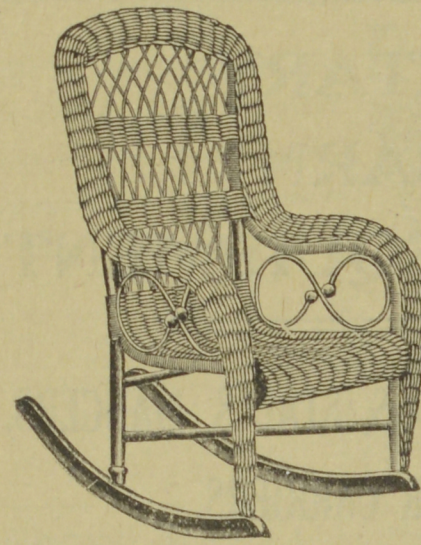

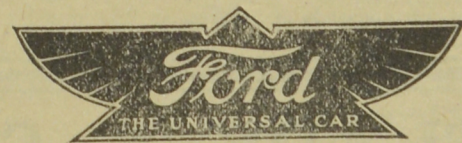
