

ELECTION PETITION—Thursday, February 18, has been set by the Chief Justice for the trial of the Carleton election petition against the return of Dr. N. R. Carleton, M.P.

AT ST. PAUL'S—There was quite large congregation at St. Paul's on Sunday to hear Rev. Mr. MacDonald although it rained very heavily. He morning sermon, a very able discourse was from II Cor. 4:6.

BRIDGE SWEEP OUT—Reid Blair, who is building a bridge across the Nashwaaksis for Col. Robinson has his work to do over again. He had the piers about built ready for the stone when a heavy freshet swept them out to the main river. The logs being spiked together make it cheaper to get new material than to tear the old piers down.

BOSTON COMEDY COMPANY—H. Price Webber and his Boston Comedy Company opened in the City Hall on Wednesday evening for a short season to a fine house. The popularity of this excellent company is plainly seen each night as Price is a general favorite and Miss Edwina Gray, his wife, has long ago won her way into the hearts of all the people. He always draws a good house when other companies have failed to do so.

LOCAL TALK—There are about sixty short course men at the Infantry School. Rev. F. C. Hartley baptized three candidates at the F. C. Baptist Church on Sunday evening. Rev. Mr. Weddall and Rev. Mr. McConnell of Gibson exchanged pulpits on Sunday morning. On Friday there were some lively brushes among the local fliers on King and Queen Streets and up the Lane. Mr. Peter Duffie has convinced his intention of being a candidate for the seat in the aldermanic board, made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Beckwith. It is now certain that there will be a contest in Carleton Ward for aldermanic honors. A three-cornered fight will take place here between Messrs. P. Farrell, Benj. Everett and M. S. Hall.

STREAMS CUT LOOSE—The rains of Sunday and Monday caused considerable damage in various parts of the county. The Nashwaak rose four feet beyond its wonted level, swept its covering of ice along with irresistible force. The islands, and low intervals all along the stream are covered with the blocks of ice some of it being fourteen inches in thickness. The ice from Peters Island swept along down in one heavy jam till the railway bridge was reached. The piers held solidly but the water rising with the jam damaged one of the piers so that trains could not cross. However it was repaired in short order so that traffic went on as usual, after the ice had passed the bridge it went on to Marysville, where it took out the temporary dam, the foot-bridge and the gate out of the ship.

AT PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS—Work at the Parliament Buildings is being pushed on as rapidly as possible. All will commend the improvements that are being made. The gallery in the legislative chamber has undergone a great change the back seats being six feet higher than before. The walls are to be covered with paper of a light terra cotta shade and the painting and decorations will be very suitable. Lady Tilley having consented to plan them and decide upon the colors. Part of the gallery will be for members and their friends. The new arrangement of seats will be ample for all.

U. S. GOLFERS HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

New York, Jan. 10—Golfers are arriving from all directions to attend the annual meeting of the United States Golf Association to be held tomorrow night at the Hotel Astor. The ticket of officers for the ensuing year as presented by the nominating committee is expected to go through without opposition according to the usual custom. Several changes have been made since the ticket was first announced. Robert C. Watson who has served four terms as secretary of the association, is slated to succeed Silas H. Strawn of the Glenview Club, Chicago, who has been president two years. Milton Dargan of Atlanta, now second vice president, is to take the place of Joseph S. Clark of Philadelphia in the first vice presidency, while Frank L. Woodward of Denver is to be second vice president. John Reid, Jr., of the St. Andrew's Golf Club, is to become treasurer. The most important business of the meeting will be the selection of the courses for the championship tournaments this year. Half a dozen golf clubs of the East are bidding for the national amateur championship, which is the event most sought. The tournament was held last year in the West.

The entire membership of the two houses of the French parliament will assemble in the historic palace of Versailles next Friday to elect a President of France for the next seven years. It is contrary to tradition for a President to accept a second term. Hence President Fallieres will not be a candidate. The latest dispatches from Paris indicate that M. Poincare, the present premier, is generally regarded as the probable choice of the national assembly for the presidency. Several other candidates are in the field, however, and the ultimate selection cannot be positively foretold.
