WILL OF LATE P. J. MORGAN

(Continued from page one)

BIG SUMS TO CHILDREN

The next articles of the will are devoted to Mr. Morgan's children. His son John Pierpont Morgan receives an outright legacy of \$3,000,000. His two married daughters, respectively Mrs. Herbert L. Satterlee and Mrs. William P. Hamilton, receive each the income for life from a trust fund of \$3,000,000. Upon the death of these daughters these trust funds are to go to their children, but each daughter is given power to dispose of said sum of \$3,000,000 by will among her issue in such shares or proportions and on such lawful trusts as she may think proper.

The third daughter, Miss Anne Tracey Morgan likewise receives for life the income from a trust fund of \$3,000,000.

Mr. Morgan's two sons-in-law, Wm. P. Hamilton and Herbert Satterlee, may receive an outright legacy of \$1,000,000 as special provision.

All the foregoing provisions for the wife and children are made preferential provisions. Having thus cared for his immediately family, Mr. Morgan proceeds to make provision for various relatives.

To Jennie Bigelow Tracey (the widow of his brother-in-law, Charles Edward Tracey) the income for life of a trust of \$1,000,000, the capital upon her death to go, per stirpes, to the issue of Charles Edward Tracey, and to his two sister-in-law, Clara Tracey Hoppi and Julia N. Brown, each the income for life from trust funds of \$100,000 each, these funds to be bequeathed in turn upon their death, to the heirs of these relatives.

To Mrs. Mary G. Sullivan, of London, a life income of \$25,000 per annum, to J. Beaver-Webb, an outright legacy of \$25,000.

Dr. James W. Markoe, a warm friend of Mr. Morgan's and of many years his personal physician, is to receive for life, and his wife after him if she survives him, an annual income of \$25,000.

\$50,000 TO HIS LIBRARIAN

Miss Bella DeCosta Green, "who has long been my efficient librarian," receives an outright legacy of \$50,000. Miss Ada Thurston, assistant librarian, receives an outright legacy of \$10,000. To Captain W. B. Porter, commander of his yacht Corsair, the sum of \$15,000 is given. There is given to Charles W. King, "for many years my private secretary the sum of \$25,000 as a mark of my appreciation of faithful service."

An unusual clause follows, showing Mr. Morgan's thought for all the people who have been near him in his daily work.

This clause reads as follows:

REMEMBERED ALL HIS EMPLOYEES

"To each of the employees, at the time of my death of my firm, J. P. Morgan & Co., of the City of New York, except Chas. W. King, above named, an amount equal to one year's salary of such employee at such time; to each person who shall survive me, who was at the time of the dissolution of my firm of J. S. Morgan & Co., of London, an employee thereof, an amount equal to

A DOUBLE ANNIVERSARY

Bucharest, April 19—Tomorrow will be the twentieth day of April, a day to be celebrated throughout Roumania because it marks the recurrence of a double anniversary of the utmost importance. On April 20, 1839, King Charles I., the beloved ruler of this country was born and on April 20, 1886, he was elected Prince of Roumania by the Roumanian assembly. It was indeed a fortunate day for the Roumanians when they called the son of the late Prince Charles of Hohenzollern-Sigmaringen, of the minor, non-reigning branch of the Hohenzollern family, to their throne. It was he who made the country what it is today, independent, strong, prosperous and respected among the powers of the world.

Roumania was originally formed by the union of two of the Danubian principalities, Wallachia and Moldavia, on December 23, 1861. The first ruler of the new principality was Colonel Cuza, who assumed the government under the name of Alexander John I. Constant discords and jealousies endangered the permanency of the country from the very beginning and when a revolution broke out in February 1866, which forced Alexander John from the throne, the future of Roumania looked indeed dark. Upon the suggestion of Napoleon III, the throne was offered to Prince Charles who was then holding a commission as lieutenant in the Prussian army. Prince Bismarck favored the choice and secretly supported it, refraining, however, from doing so openly owing to the already strained relations between Prussia and Austria which soon thereafter led to the war of 1866. Austria was opposed to the choice and would have gone to the extreme of arresting the young prince on his way to Roumania, had he not outwitted the Austrian government by passing through Austria in disguise. He entered Bucharest, received by the people with enthusiasm, May 22, 1866 and was acclaimed Prince of Roumania.

It was by no means a sinecure which Charles had taken upon his shoulders when he consented to become the ruler of Roumania. Internal dissensions caused constant ferment among the numerous factions and the relations between Roumania and the adjoining countries were far from being friendly. The resources of Roumania were extremely meagre; trade and industries were demoralized, the national defences were disorganized and it seemed that the days of the country's independence were numbered. But Charles proved himself the right man for his position, a great ruler, strong and energetic, filled with the ambition to restore order and prosperity in his country and to increase and strengthen its power among the nations of Europe.

The cheque was on the Intercolonial Railway of Canada and was passed at Irvin's tobacco store. The endorsement on the cheque cannot be made out but the man who passed it is well known by sight. It is expected that he will be captured.
