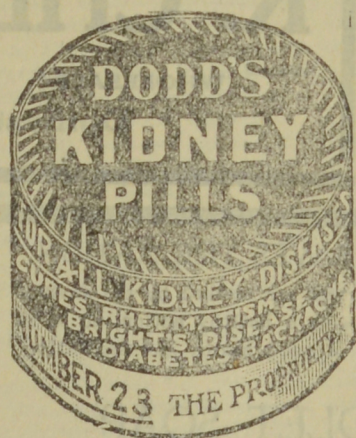
## WILL WAGE WAR UPON THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC

Four thousand Presbyterians, picked delegates from all the provinces, went on emphatic record in their congress yesterday to take no rest and to give none until the liquor traffic, root and branch, is cleaned out of Canada. This was the most deliberate, the most determined, the most unreserved resolution of the entire congress. It asked for no quarter from the trade and it resolved to give no quarter.

Canada was the slogan of Dr. A.S. Grant—Canada and Christ. With all the cool-minded calculation of a practical man of affairs, with all the defiant abandon of a Scottish Celt, and with all the zeal and faith of an old-time prophet of Jehovah, he went straight to the task. He had gone over too many of the hard trails of life, in eastern Canada and in the Yukon, and he had spent too much time and money trying to "patch up" the lives torn and wrecked by the saloon, for him to have patience with the kid-glove policy of temporizing and compromise. Importation, manufacture and sale—against the whole liquor business, distillery, brewery, bar-room, shop, dive, he launched his charge.

And four thousand Presbyterians of like breed and blood stood to their feet, hundreds of them on their chairs pledging themselves, their religious faith, their political power, their money, too, for the campaign which he called upon that congress to inaugurate.

It might be well for premiers, party leaders, politicians of all ranks and sides, to move a note. That act of yesterday was no "flash in the pan." Back of it is a faith such as in the days of old made potentates and princes cower. Every principle of ethics, every sound maxim of modern business, and every demand of Canadian democracy is against the bar-room and all its allies. The traffic has done its arrogant worst



## SIR WILFRID LAURIER STRONGLY URGES AN APPEAL

Some hon. members: "Hear, hear." Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "Sir, I am not prepared—yes I am prepared—for this statement. It is quite in keeping with the career of the Conservative party. That has been their stock argument for sixty, seventy, eighty years past. There never was a reform put upon the statute book by the Liberal party.

Some hon. members: "Oh, Oh." Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "But it was charged with disloyalty by the conservative party.

"In regard to that, it is sufficient to quote my Right Hon. friend."

Here Sir Wilfrid quoted a statement by Mr. Borden in 1910, that a Canadian navy had no more tendency to separation from the Empire than a Canadian Militia. He concluded:—

"This is the answer that I have to give to hon. gentlemen on the other side of the House. I know quite well their answer will be that the Canadian navy is a separatist policy. My Right Hon. friend will try to arouse the prejudices of the people in Ontario.

"His confreres will endeavour to arouse the prejudices of the people in Quebec. We are accustomed to that. We have fought it before; we shall fight it again. No amount of argument will convince the people, not even when it comes from the mouth of the hon. member from Calgary, Mr. R. B. Bennett, who has tried and has failed and will fail again.

"He says that the Canadian Navy means disloyalty. That means that Sir Geo. Cartier, the fathers of Confederation, who first were in favour of the principle of a Canadian militia, were disloyal.

"Our policy is a Canadian navy. We desire to help the British Empire, only taking our share in building up a Canadian navy. We wish to have the navy manned and equipped in Canada. On that question we have taken our stand. Upon it we stand today, and I invite my hon. friends to give us a chance of putting it before the people."

## WILL OPEN CAMPAIGN IN TORY TORONTO

Ottawa, June 7.—The last words spoken in the House of Commons before prorogation yesterday afternoon by Sir Wilfrid Laurier brought his followers to their feet wildly cheering.

"I am sincere he declared in my desire for an election and I will start the campaign in Toronto."

The Hon. Mr. White, Minister of Finance, objected to an election in such a time (he said) of financial stringency.

"The country," interposed Mr. Pugsley may draw its own conclusions from the fact that the worst financial depression in years has synchronized within the first two years of the present administration and notwithstanding the fact that the tide of immigration has increased and the harvest has been bounteous."

Mr. Pugsley added that the present depression could have been cured by accepting the Liberal policy of wider markets.
