REV. DR. GATES IN
MONCTON PULPIT

Preached Anniversary Sermon of First
Baptist Church—Made Reference
to Late Judge Steadman

(Moncton Transcript.)

The eighty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the Moncton First Baptist Church was observed in Sunday, the preacher for the day being Rev. G. O. Gates, D.D., a former pastor of the church and subsequently pastor of the Germain Street Baptist church St. John. Dr. Gates is the oldest former pastor of the church now living. He was warmly greeted yesterday by members of the congregation particularly the older ones who have pleasant recollections of his pastorate here many years ago which was very successful.

Before Dr. Gates was introduced at the morning service, the pastor, Rev. G. A. Lawson, again expressed his appreciation of the kindness shown towards him during the week, when many members of his own congregation and other congregations in the city assembled at the home of Ald. E. A. Fryers and presented him with a valuable driving horse to take the place of one he lost by tetanus during the week of the big fire.

Rev. Mr. Lawson, on behalf of the congregation, extended a hearty welcome to Dr. Gates.

Dr. Gates said he was glad to be present, although regretting the fact that the congregation no longer enjoyed the privilege of worshipping in the old church home.

"Be encouraged," he said. "Brighter days are before you. God has a magnificent work for you to perform in this city. Eighty-five years ago this church was organized. That was a long time ago and none of the members then present are living today. Perhaps there are some living now who were boys and girls at that time. Three weeks ago, at Fredericton, I buried a man who was ten years of age on the day this church was organized. I refer to the late Judge Steadman. His body was laid away in a cemetery overlooking the beautiful St. John River, just outside the City of Fredericton. During the last year of his life again and again his memory recalled scenes of his early boyhood in Moncton. Again and again he longed to return to the home of his youth."

Dr. Gates touched upon the influence that has been exerted by the Moncton First Baptist Church through the men and the women who have gone out from it to all parts of the Dominion.

"I presume that I am the oldest living pastor this church has had. All the ministers before the beginning of my pastorate in 1880 have gone to their reward. Thirty-three years ago I came to this city a stranger and assumed the pastorate on a beautiful morning in June. And then followed years in which God's blessing rested upon us. The old church building was a piece of beautiful architecture. You enlarged it, adding wing upon wing. I hope some of the fine lines will be seen in the new building—a building grander and more capable of resisting fire. We

Duffield, Solicitor of said petitioner, ORDERED that said application be heard by the Chancellor at the State House in the City of Trenton on the tenth day of June 1913, at ten thirty o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard, at which time and place the Chancellor will hear all parties in interest who may then appear.

It is further ordered that notice of such hearing shall be given to the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance of this State by serving a copy of this order upon him within fifteen days from the making thereof, and that notice of said application be given to the policyholders of the said corporation by publishing a copy of this order in one or more newspapers printed and published in the capital of each and every State of the United States in which the corporation does business and in a newspaper printed and published in the cities of Edmonton, Alberta; Victoria, British Columbia; Winnipeg, Manitoba; Fredericton, New Brunswick; Halifax, Nova Scotia; Toronto, Ontario; Quebec, Quebec and Regina, Saskatchewan in the Dominion of Canada, once a week for at least four weeks, the first publication to be made within fifteen days from the date hereof. In case no newspaper is published in the capital of said States of the United States, then said publication may be made in a newspaper having a general circulation within said States.
