ZER ESTATE DISMISS-
ED WITH COSTS

Commission Originally Allowed Widow
as Executrix Stands—Chinese Case
Appealed From St. John
County Court

The appeal of Mrs Sarah Louise Manzer, formerly Mrs Joseph Colter of this city, for an equal apportionment of the commission between herself as executrix and Guy B. Manzer as executor of the estate of the late Benjamin Bedford Manzer of Woodstock, was before the Supreme Court this morning. Mr. P. J. Hughes appeared for Mrs Manzer and moved that the commission allowed the appellant as executrix be increased. Mr. A. B. Connell, K. C. was not called.

The appeal was dismissed with costs. The costs of opposing this motion are to be paid out of the estate.

Mrs. Manzer had been allowed commission of one sixth of one per cent. and the executor 4 1/2 per cent.

COUNTY COURT APPEAL

In the case of Hum Ying vs. Hum Foo, an appeal from the St. John County Court in a case between two Chinese residents of St. John City. Mr. Daniel Mullin, K. C., supported the appeal of the plaintiff.

Mr. J. A. Barry, contra objected that notice of appeal had not been given within the time allowed by the act and the time was extended by a judge of the Supreme Court when it should have been by a judge of the county court.

The court proceeded with the argument and will consider the preliminary objection. Court considers.

KING'S BENCH DIVISION

In the case of Ella Brown and Arthur H. Brown vs. George Bartlett in the King's Bench Division. Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C., supported the appeal from the order of Judge Barry granting an order to take the evidence of a witness out of the province by special examiner, the order being dated April 26, 1913.

The case was in progress when the court took recess at 1 p. m.

HAS A SEVERE
LOSS BY FIRE

Saw Mill and Grist Mill at Temperance
Vale Burned to Ground With all
Their Contents—Dwelling-
Houses Destroyed

A saw-mill at Temperance Vale, the property of Mr. James K. Pinder, M.P.P., and also a grist-mill which he owned, were totally destroyed by fire last evening, together with all their contents.

Mr. Pinder and his son George, were in the city yesterday and upon their return home by train in the evening they saw the grist mill in flames. A dwelling-house near by, owned by a man named Fox, was also on fire and the supposition is that the flames spread from the building to the mills. The neighbors turned out in force but as a strong wind prevailed at the time and the place having no apparatus with which to fight fire, it was not long before the buildings were levelled to the ground. Besides the mills two dwelling-houses were destroyed. A wooden bridge over the Nackawick stream also went up in smoke.

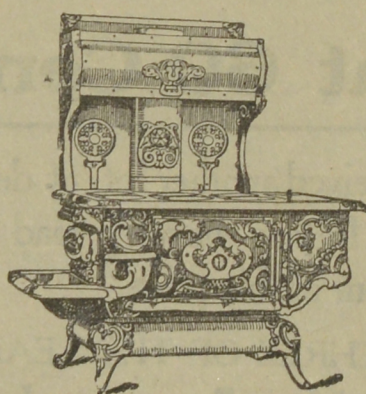

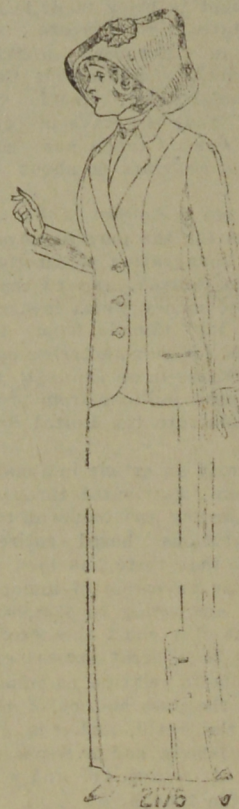
