

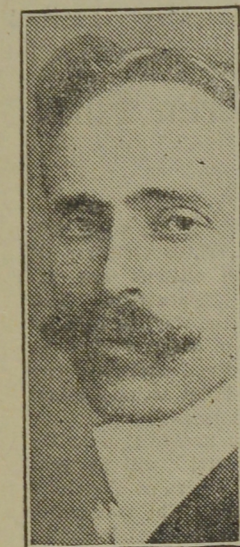

ADmiral PEARY FORMALLY RECEIVED BY UNIVERSITY

Paris, June 6—Rear Admiral Robert E. Peary was formally received today by the University of Paris. The event was attended by a distinguished company that gave the American explorer a cordial welcome. Prince Roland Bonaparte presided and in his introductory address declared that though the opening decade of the twentieth century had been notable for historic achievements, nothing moved the world to greater wonder than Peary's annexation of the North Pole.

VICTORIA MILLS BURNED—The mill below town known as the Victoria Mill was totally destroyed by fire on Thursday morning. The blaze was first noticed at about four o'clock on the roof and an alarm was given as soon as possible but all efforts were unavailable and the property was soon a heap of ruins. The lumber piles caught and three carloads of shingles and two carloads of lath were destroyed. The fire-engine Alexandria was sent down from the city and did much service especially in saving the lumber and the wharves the property was worth about \$40,000 and was insured for \$29,000.
