## CORRESPONDENCE

### THE MAN BEHIND THE GUN

To the Editor of The Mail

Sir,—Allow me a few words with the "Man behind the Gun". I shall condense to the limit. With the personal and political points at issue between the parties I have nothing to do. But just a few brief words on the historical question.

Marcus Brutus (50 B.C.) must not be confounded with Lucius Brutus, the great Roman patriot, who assisted in the banishment of the Targuins (about 500 B.C.)

The character of M. Brutus may be best judged by his acts. "Caesar" had received many warnings of his danger, but he was too true a man to play the coward. On the 15th March 44 B.C. he entered the Senate House where the assassins attacked him. Caesar was the first to strike. Caesar had hurled back three of them. At this moment Brutus whom he had loved and trusted and loaded with favors struck him. This ingratitude paralyzed his arm. Exclaiming reproachfully: "And thou, Brutus!" Caesar covered his face with his toga and fell at the feet of Pompey's statue covered with wounds. So died the greatest of the Romans. (Hist.) "And at the base of Pompey's statue which all the while ran blood great Caesar fell." (Shaksp.)

All are familiar with Anthony's oration from Shakespeare, but here are a few words (from memory) of a prose version by Quintilian:

"Caesar's noble soul would not permit him to ramble idly in Rome. He conquered Gaul, reconquered Spain, Egypt and the East. He would have added Britain and Germany to the Empire but his enemies would not have it so.

Pompey and the Patricians fled into Greece to bring the East upon you. . . . and now Caesar the Father of his people lies dead, not by natural causes, not by the visitation of God, not by the swords of his enemies but here in the heart of Rome in the Senate house by the hands of his own countrymen. O Caesar! Alas! for human ingratitude alas! for the gray hairs, dabbled with blood, those lacerated wounds and this blood-stained robe, in which you were prepared for the sacrifice!"

Brutus and Cassius fled from Rome appealed to the Provinces but were defeated in Greece by Anthony and Octavius, 42 B.C. Brutus and Cassius both committed suicide.
