A SHAMEFUL INSINUATION

While Mr. Borden was evidently ashamed of his alliance with the anti-Imperialist Nationalists during his visit to Toronto, he made it apparent that he was devoid of any sense of personal shame. He stopped short of deliberate untruth, but he was guilty of those half truths which are more pernicious than direct lies, in trying to impute to Sir Wilfrid Laurier an alliance with those few Nationalists the present government could not buy or bribe when in office. Discussing the incident when Mr. Guilbault, an honorable if misguided Nationalist, declared that he would vote for Sir Wilfrid Laurier's six months' hoist to the Naval Bill, Mr. Borden said—

"One of the prominent Nationalists in the House of Commons vied with Sir Wilfrid Laurier for the honor of moving the six months' hoist. Sir Wilfrid won by a neck, but the Nationalist immediately rose and said that he seconded the motion. 'Two souls with but a single thought two hearts that beat as one.'"

Mr. Borden always posed as a high-minded gentleman, who might have a bad partner or two in his government, but who was personally immaculate. On this occasion he showed that the Tory idol has feet of clay. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's six months' motion was seconded by Hon. Mr. Graham, before Mr. Guilbault spoke at all, as Mr. Borden well knew. Further, Mr. Guilbault repudiated the idea of supporting Sir Wilfrid Laurier just as strongly as Mr. Borden.

Even Mr. Borden understands enough French to have understood what Mr. Guilbault said, which was—

"I myself, intended to propose this motion that the Leader of the Opposition has made, but not for the same reasons. . . . For my part, as in the past, I have condemned the policy of the Leader of the Opposition; today I condemn the proposition of the Government. . . . I oppose with all my force that the first step should be made in voting for a temporary contribution without first consulting the people. It is for this reason I shall vote in favor of the amendment of the Opposition Leader, BUT NOT FOR THE MOTIVES THAT HE GIVES."

Mr. Borden's contemptible insinuations at Toronto, were perfectly in line with his policy of playing the Imperialist in Ontario, and flogging with the Nationalists in Quebec. The kind of craft he exhibited was as far removed from statecraft as it was from any idea of fairness to a chivalrous opponent.

At the York County Court this week the presiding judge in commenting on the delay experienced by the crown prosecutor is securing the depositions in a criminal case, suggested that the police magistrate of Fredericton should be provided with a stenographer. The fact that the Police Magistrate does not write as legible a hand as he once did probably inspired His Honor to throw out this suggestion. The employment of a stenographer in the police court would no doubt have a beneficial effect on the administration of justice in this city, but we believe a more effective remedy would be a good superannuation allowance for the Police Magistrate, which would enable him to retire and spend his remaining years in ease and comfort. He has given the city forty-two years of honorable service, and should be given an opportunity to enjoy a well earned rest. This is a matter which should have the serious consideration of Attorney General Grimmer.

The session of the federal parliament which ended yesterday has been one of the most strenuous since confederation. The Borden naval bill, which proposed a gift of thirty-five million dollars to the British admiralty, was the all important question before parliament and it was fought so strenuously by the Liberal opposition that gag methods had to be employed in order to insure its passage. After five months of debate, it reached the senate only to be held by

the Liberal majority in that body, which adopted an amendment setting forth that the measure could not become law until submitted to the judgment of the electorate.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley appeared in parliament on Thursday after several weeks' absence through illness, and received a great ovation from his Liberal colleagues. The ex-minister of public works is one of the most brilliant men in Canadian public life and during the recent session has rendered yonnan service to the Liberal cause.

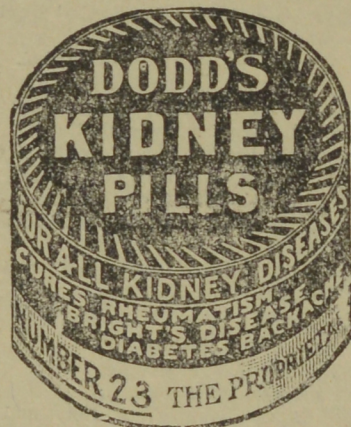
(Continued from page eight) ant of the laws of the country and that he had a wife and family in Russia that the sentence was made light.
