NORMAL SCHOOL

(Continued from page one)

Our Cadet Corps, under the able direction of Mr. McFarlane, has not, we feel, disgraced either itself or the school. One thing that we have missed this year is a debating society. A little practice in speaking and debating is of incalculable value in after life, and, though few of us will here when the Normal School opens again, we hope that next year's students will have the advantage of such a training.

NOT STANDING STILL.

Of one thing we may be assured: that the Normal School is not standing still but is keeping up with the progress of the times. A glance at the preparations even now being made to enlarge the building is enough to satisfy anyone that this is so. We may go farther, then, with a feeling of pride that this institution plays so great a part and is destined to play so much greater a part, in the education of the province.

ESSENTIAL FACTS.

The great essential fact, however, of this year's progress is, that we were learning how to act and why to act in our profession. It has been a time of preparation for us, a time of added responsibility for many—that responsibility which comes when the conception of a life work, a work that demands our best, is clearly realized. And yet this change in many of us has not been expressed in the outward activities of the year. It is one that is going on silently day by day in our natures. We do not express it; we rather hesitate to talk about it; it works quietly with us. Nevertheless, it is the great matter of value, perhaps, that the year has left for us. We may, in the course of time, forget many things that we have learned here, we may forget the social functions we attended, we may forget the details of athletics and physical training; but the permanent work that the year has given to our characters, the more mature outlook on life, the realization of our personal responsibility to society and to ourselves these can never be taken away from us; they are a possession forever.

Perhaps you may say that I am laying too much stress on this one point. Many doubtless had their life-work planned out before they came to Normal School. Yet if these very persons will examine their minds now and compare their state with that of a year ago, I doubt not but they will find a great difference. The old conceptions have been broadened, strengthened, have been given a surer foundation in reason. It is for this most of all that we own our gratitude to this institution to which we must now say farewell.

FAREWELL

To the members of the faculty: to you it is given to impress your personality and method on us, that we may impress it on our province. May we do our part as well as you have yours! We realize as we are going out into the world what you have done for us; we thank you for it.

Fellow-students: there is a tie that binds us together tonight—one that has grown with our associations in this building, till we feel now a real regret that the well-known Assembly Hall with its crowd of familiar faces is to pass out of our lives forever. Yes, forever; for though we may return, it will be to find ourselves, "among new men strange faces, other minds." The old ties, then, must be broken; but in the future the sight of some face, not seen perhaps for years may call up the old memories again. May they be memories of pleasure, not of pain; of satisfaction, not of disappointment; and may it be to us, as we look back no cause for regret that we once spent a year at the Provincial Normal School.

"The senate has been loyal to the constitution, loyal to Canada, and loyal to the empire in the action which it took," said Hon. Dr. Pugsley. "The bill of the government sought to do an unconstitutional thing which the people of Canada would not approve of."

"If the people of Canada were in favor of the contribution the government could easily arrange to have it sent. All that the government has to do is to appeal to the people. If they are returned they can introduce this bill and it will be carried without opposition in either house. The whole thing could be done and the money placed in the hands of the British admiralty within six weeks, long before Mr. Churchill could arrange to lay down the keels of the three ships in England."

"If the people do not favor contribution and say so, a Canadian navy will be at once started."

"It is a thousand pities that the minister of marine did not accept the tender of Cammel Laird & Co. If he had ratified the contract which we left ready for his signature ships of the Canadian fleet would now be under construction in St. John."

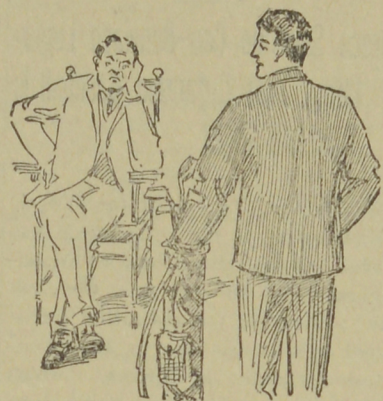

dency of General Field Marshal Count von Haeseler, who in the name of the German army will hand to the Kaiser a costly field marshal's baton to the cost of which every officer in the army has contributed.

The Kaiser will signalize his jubilee by commuting the sentences of many prisoners and pardoning others. He will also grant titles of nobility and will probably record a number of orders and decorations.

The general harmony of the celebration promises to be disturbed by the discordant note of the Socialists who are said to be planning to hold immense mass meetings during jubilee week to protest against the increased military and naval expenditures. To offset the effect of these demonstrations the loyalist press is laying great stress on the fact that the Kaiser during his reign of twenty-five years has been one of the strongest peace factors in Europe.
