St. John Beat St. Croix
And Now Tops LeagueFOGEL WANTS
BASEBALL TRUST
INVESTIGATED

Horace Says he Can Convince Legislators That Organized Baseball is Trust All Right

Washington, June 5—Horace Fogel, former owner of the Philadelphia National League club, came to Washington today to urge upon Congress the passage of the resolution introduced some weeks ago by Representative Gallagher of Illinois, which would direct an investigation into organized baseball on the ground that it operates as a trust in violation of the Sherman law.

Mr. Fogel conferred with Congressman Gallagher and other representatives and later talked with Representative Henry, chairman of the House Rules Committee. Representative Henry agreed to call a meeting of the Rules Committee some time next week to consider the Gallagher resolution and Mr. Fogel promised to appear.

"I can show the committee enough evidence that organized baseball is a trust to convince them of the necessity of an investigation such as Congressman Gallagher proposes," Mr. Fogel said. "I promised Representative Henry that I would have before the Rules Committee important witnesses from Chicago, St. Louis, Pittsburgh and also some minor league baseball towns."

Mr. Fogel also called on Attorney General McReynolds to arrange for an appointment. He will see the Attorney General tomorrow, but he favors a Congressional inquiry into the affairs of the leagues before urging Mr. McReynolds to institute an inquiry.

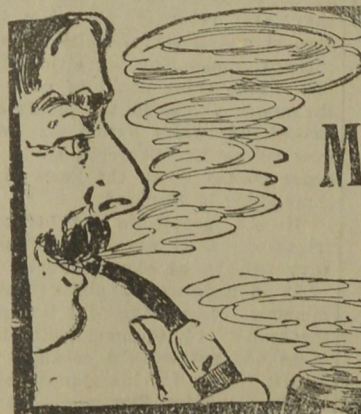
