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## CANADA AND LIBERALISM

Copies of an address given by Mr. N. W. Rowell, K. C., Leader of the Liberal Party in Ontario, on "What Liberalism has done for Canada" before the Montreal Reform Club on November 10th, last, will be ready for a free distribution in a short time from the Central Liberal Information Office, 63 Sparks Street, Ottawa. In this address Mr. Rowell gave a careful outline of the work done by the Liberal party in shaping the destinies of Canada, not only in her domestic affairs, but also in her relations with the Mother Country and the rest of the Empire, especially with the regard to the development of political and trade relations and Canada's share in the problems of defence. He particularly showed the effect of the Liberal principles on the main events in Canadian history—the early struggles for responsible government, Canadian Confederation; Canada's evolution from a colony to the status of a self-governing nation, and finally her entry into Imperial affairs with the creation of the Imperial Conference.

Mr. Rowell lays stress upon the noble work done by Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the head of the Liberal Party in this national and Imperial development, and shows that "It was the triumphs of the Federal principle—the Liberal principle giving local autonomy to the Provinces that has made possible the development of our Canadian Confederation as it is to-day; and it is the extension of that principle to the other self-government of harmonious co-operation with the Mother land that we witness today."

Mr. Rowell's address throughout is one of keen interest, and should be read by all Liberals as an illuminative justification of their political faith.

## MR. BORDEN'S ACROBATICS

Before gaining power through his alliance with the Nationalists, Mr. Borden had not even suspected the existence of any Imperial emergency which would demand what Winston Churchill described as "the flinging about of millions on an impetuous impulse." In fact, he was, if possible, a more ardent supporter of Canadian naval units than Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself.

This is what he said, speaking to his own people at Halifax on October 14th, 1909, regarding the duties of the Canadian people:—

"One governing principle at least should control, namely, that out of our own material, by our own labor, and by the instructed skill of our own people, any necessary provision for our naval defences should be made so far as may be reasonably possible. In this connection may we not hope that there shall be given a stimulus and encouragement to the shipbuilding industry of Canada which has long been lacking."

All that "governing principle" has now been abandoned. Evidently with the Nationalist coalition it is no longer "reasonably possible." Now Mr. Borden proposes to stimulate the shipbuilding industry of Canada by shipping \$35,000,000 of the cash product of "our own materials, our own labour, and the instructed skill of our own people" to increase the vast shipbuilding and armament constructing industries of Great Britain.

Fredericton's death rate is only sixteen per thousand, which means that it is a pretty healthy town to live in. Perhaps this is one of the reasons that the doctors have decided to boost their prices.

Canada's foreign trade has touched the billion dollar mark. It is a safe gamble that over fifty per cent of it is with the United States. Although we have a Tory government we are still having "truck with the Yankees."

## SOTCK MARKET

New York, Jan. 3.—The market opening was dull on account of reports from Europe. Traders favored selling side but there was good buying on decline, the belated re-investment of January interests and dividend money being a factor. During the first half hour the market was to some extent affected by weakness in Copper. Beat Sugar and break in Western Maryland, but stocks in general were well bought on decline and undertone was good. Bear interests appeared to be using Beet Sugar as a club to hammer down the general market. As a weapon it was not entirely effective. The stock sold down to 45. Apparently the stock is being used as a mere speculative medium whose movement have little or no relation to general conditions or even the state of the sugar industry.

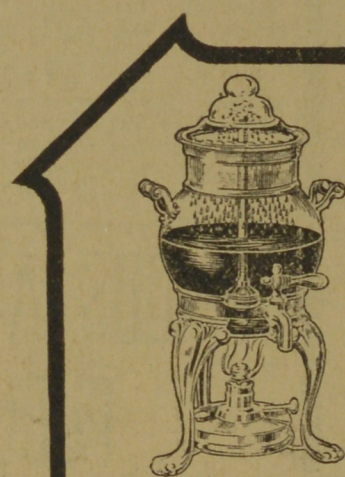
