## NAVIGATION

SEASON OPENED  
THIS MORNING

Tug Annie Currier Arrived From Oromocto With Barge—Repair Work on Highway Bridge Begun by D. C. Burpee & Son

The season of navigation was opened this morning with the arrival of the tug Annie Currier from Oromocto with a barge. The Currier will give a tri-weekly service between this city and Oromocto during the season. The service will begin tomorrow. Conditions along the river between this city and Oromocto are reported by those who arrived on the Currier today, to be similar to those here. The ice is winged along both banks and only a marked rise in water will cause it to run out.

## REPAIRS TO BRIDGE.

A crew of men employed by D. C. Burpee & Son of Gibson, is now at work at the Highway Bridge, making preparations for the erection of the temporary structure which is to replace the draw-span. D. C. Burpee & Son have the contract for the piling. The ice between the two piers at the ends of the missing span is packed in solidly enough to bear considerable weight and some of the more venturesome of the residents of St. Mary's and Nashwaakisis crossed on it this morning, climbing up and down the piers.

## NO CABLE TILL SUMMER.

The crew of the New Brunswick Telephone Company is still engaged at the bridge making repairs under the direction of Mr. J. E. Marshall, superintendent of construction. The cable which was torn away when the pier was carried away by the ice will not be replaced until summer as it will be about two months before it arrives here. In the meantime the telephone service will be maintained by overhead lines.

## KINGSCLEAR RESORT

RAIDED BY DEPUTY  
SHERIFF YESTERDAY

Police of City Assisted—Large Bottle was Found—Contents to be Sent to St. John for Analysis

Deputy Sheriff J. F. Timmins, who is also Canada Temperance Act Inspector for York County, yesterday raided the resort known as "The Farm," situated in Lower Kingsclear, about three miles from the city. Chief of Police McCollom, Police Sergt. Duncan and Policeman Chapman accompanied Inspector Timmins. The raid was in connection with the enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act. The premises were searched and in a rear room a large bottle, two or three feet high, which evidently at one time had been a bar-room fixture was discovered. The bottle contained a light-colored liquid and was brought to the city by the searchers.

Inspector Timmins stated today that the nature of the contents of the bottle would determine whether or not information would be laid against the proprietor of the house.
