BRANCH LINE BILL

Pittawa, June 3—The senate today amended one government bill and gave a third reading to several others. The branch line bill under which the minister of railways has authority to acquire branches for the government railway system was the first measure taken up.

There was a protest against the provision allowing the minister to lease a line up to a length of 200 miles without obtaining special authority from parliament.

Senator Dandurand moved by way of amendment that any such lease or undertaking should be ratified by parliament before the government could enter upon it.

Hon. Mr. Loughheed took the ground that this was a money bill which the senate could not amend and said that the commons would certainly take that view of any change which the senate might make in the bill.

Senator Dandurand said the branch lines bill of 1910 had been amended by the senate and the commons had accepted the amendments without raising the question that it was a money bill.

Hon. Mr. Loughheed replied that because the point of order was not raised in 1910, did not prove that it could not have been successfully sustained then or that it could not properly be raised now. The bill had been introduced into the commons as a money bill resolution.

Sir Lyman Jones who was in the chair presiding over the committee of the whole, said the bill was entitled: "A bill to amend the railway Act." It appeared to be an enabling measure rather than a money bill and the amendment was adopted by 36 to 11.

The bill was reported from committee and the approval of the report was moved by Senator Dandurand.

Hon. Mr. Loughheed again raised the same point of order.

Speaker Landry said the bill gave the minister of railways "power to acquire by purchase or lease" one or more branch lines. He was of the opinion that the money for the purpose could be obtained from consolidated revenue without the vote of parliament as judges salaries are paid. It was therefore a money bill and the amendment was out of order.

TRADE IS NOT EXTENDING AS EXPECTED

Bradstreet's Montreal Trade Report of May 29 says:

"The expansion of trade in wholesale lines has not developed to any extent during the week. The heavy stocks of fall and winter goods that have been carried over by retailers from last year, has caused a dearth of fall orders, business being made up principally of sorting orders, and not many of these came to hand. The scarcity of money is still felt all over the country, especially in real estate and building circles. Some of our large buildings have had to remain unfinished for this season, and some large rates of interest have been paid for some big temporary loans for short periods, while others have been unable to get loans on real estate investments in some of the outlying districts, and the prevailing opinion is that money today is as tight as it has been at any time during this year, and there seems to be no hopeful outlook at present that it will be any easier.

That general rate of discount on commercial paper and loans is 6½ per cent. The case count of buying eggs will disappear in the produce trade this week. On and after the first of June, eggs will be paid for in the country according to size and quality. The new grades to be adopted are three, and are designated as follows:—New laid eggs which are sound, sweet and not more than five days old. First are to be sound, sweet, with limited shrinkage. Seconds inferior quality, but not bad, stale eggs do not count.

The import and export trade continues heavy. Remittances and collections are slow. Retail trade is quiet.

The report was declared adopted by the same division.

Francis R. Larkin, the bridegroom belongs to one of New York's prominent families. He graduated from Princeton University two years ago and has since been engaged in business in this city.

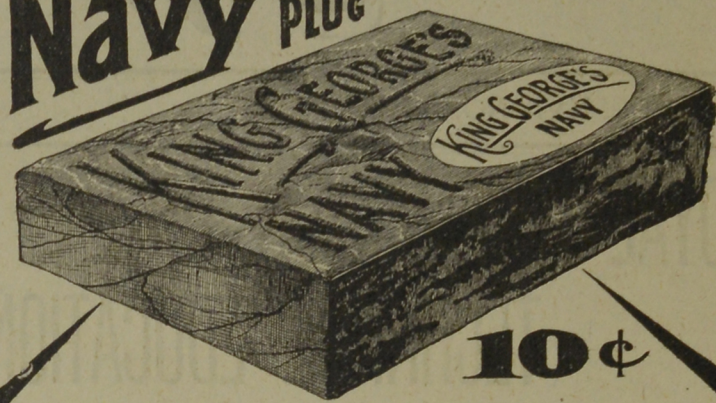

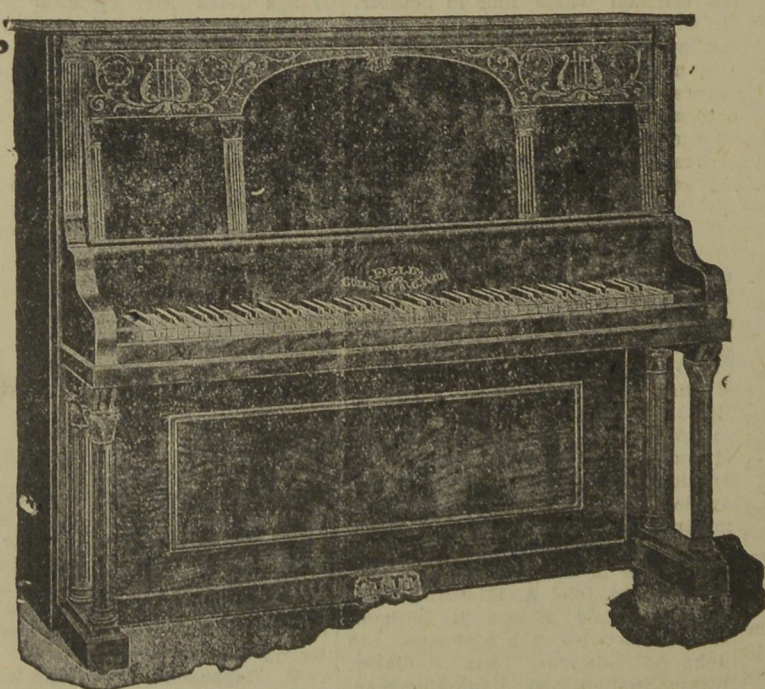
