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WILL HE KEEP HIS WORD?

Shortly after his return from England last year, Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden was given a great banquet at Montreal on September 21st, to celebrate the first anniversary of his election as head of a Conservative Government. It was made an unusually important event. There were 600 guests, with delegations representing every Province of the Dominion, practically the whole centre of the Conservative party being present—the Nationalist wing not being represented as that alliance had not then become predominant. In view of this, Mr. Borden followed the English custom of making important announcements at such semi-state affairs. The Prime Minister gave a guarded account of what had taken place during his visit to England, and what he intended to do. Quoting a statement made while Leader of the Opposition, so as to reaffirm it as Prime Minister Mr. Borden said:

"I said it would be our plain duty, that the Government of this country could ascertain if they took proper action for that purpose, to find whether the naval issues were grave. That if we were in power we would find this and get an unvarnished answer and that if the answer to that question by the Government of the Mother Country and the reports of the Admiralty experts were such as to demand immediate action, then we would appeal to Parliament for immediate effective aid, AND IF PARLIAMENT DID NOT GIVE THAT AID THAT I WOULD APPEAL FROM PARLIAMENT TO THE PEOPLE OF CANADA." This statement was received with tremendous cheering by the 600 leading Conservative guests.

Mr. Borden proceeded to say that he regarded the position as so grave that although he had not wished to call Parliament before January 1913, he had decided to call it early in November, and proceeded, "I INTEND SIMPLY TO PLACE OUR CASE BEFORE PARLIAMENT AND THE PEOPLE OF CANADA."

Eight months have passed since then. Mr. Borden has produced his emergency naval aid bill. He has jammed it through the House of Commons by the closure, for the first time in Canada's history. He has been able to bulldoze the House of Commons. He cannot bulldoze the Senate. The Senate has given plain intimation that in view of its responsibility to the people it cannot pass this measure until the people have spoken. Therefore Parliament has refused to adopt the measure providing what Mr. Borden is pleased to call "immediate effective aid."

Will the Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden, Prime Minister of Canada, now proceed to show his trust in the people, or will he persist in his present course and add his solemn pledge of September 21st, 1912 to the already long list of broken pledges he has to his discredit?

SOME GOOD ADVICE

As the stock market is attracting a great deal of attention these days, especially from those who were holding C. P. R. and other stocks on margin when the recent slump took place, the following extract from a letter written by a gentleman connected with a large brokerage firm in New York to a friend in Fredericton, will be read with considerable interest:

"I have shown the actual working of the useful side of Wall Street. Now the other side is margin trading, which is an amusement quite often profitable to the very wealthy man whose capital is so large, that with them it is really not margin trading at all. But for the ordinary business man it is worse than unlimited boozing and equal to taking dope. You can take it from me—and I take it from actual statistics—that all margin traders except the multi-millionaires are ruined thereby if they continue in the game. Why? Because it is gambling pure and simple, and gambling that is more complicated than dice or roulette. When a person goes into a gambling den he either loses at once, or he wins and sticks around until he eventually fritters away his original stake and winnings. So cut out these artificial dreams of wealth, and be glad you have a comfortable home, good food and sufficient steady work to keep your body and mind occupied. My advice is never buy one share of stock except for cash and outright. If you adhere to this rule you will live to a good prosperous old age, but if you continue to trade on margin you

will eventually be forced to the wall. Supposing you run your bank roll up to \$1000 or so, you cannot avoid buying one hundred shares when some wise guy comes along with a positive sure thing tip on a good listed stock. Then something happens, war, earthquake, tariff changes, or new invention. Your stock drops thirty points in as many minutes, and you are in debt \$2000. Or perhaps the market goes off in a slow, suicidal manner, and after you have put up your last dollar, hypothecated your insurance policy and pawned the family jewels, it drops another five points and you are penniless, and have formed a new habit called insomnia. If you must speculate be man enough not to squeal when you get shot full of holes, but take your medicine. It is just as easy to lose a dollar as it is to make one. There is no such thing in the world as being on the inside. You may be today but you won't be tomorrow. Remember you are bucking against the forces of nature, such as war, famine earthquakes, poor crops, good crops, floods, tariffs, hard times, good times etc."

St. John Times:—The Standard has discovered that Senator Ellis is a fine exponent of the principles of true Liberalism. 3 Secondary education for those who have gone to work should be provided in day and evening classes in close co-relation with their occupations while they are still learners, and also when they have become skilled workmen or journeymen or have come to fill positions as foremen, superintendents of managers.

1. That workers in factories whose main task is to attend or operate machines should receive instruction and training which would give some all-round power and skill, and increase their interests beyond the routine of automatic operations.

2. That such training should be provided as will conserve and develop occupations wherein skilled handicraft is required.

3. That the interests of the rural population should be conserved and be promoted as far as possible by industrial training and technical education suitable to the needs of its workers.

4. That the needs of the girls and women for organized instruction and training in the elements of the sciences and arts which underlie successful housekeeping and home-making under modern industrial conditions, should be recognized and provided for.

5. That increasing attention should be given to opportunities which now exist or which may be provided, for the conservation of life and health and for the development of human powers.

A feature of the report is the attention it gives to the problems of rural communities. The report also recommends schools for fishermen and instruction in packing, etc.
