OLD FAVORITES WELCOMED.

Doyle's Wonders made their bow to Fredericton fans including in their number Mr. "Red" Wildes, who in former seasons—1911 and 1912 to be exact—sojourned in our midst. "Red" played good ball and as he has a big bunch of supporters in Fredericton who would like to see him again wearing Grey and Blue, got the glad hand. His reception was no heartier than that given Duggan. The latter of course is our own "P. J.," who is back with the Pets to help them prove themselves for the third time the best team of the N. B.—Maine League. He was in his old position in left field and took his only fielding chance in great style, sailing over into centre-field after a long fly. With the stick he did nothing but then very few did, Bert White and Sullivan being the only Fredericton players to connect with Lee's slants and they having only three hits between them.

SOME GAME.

It was some game. Each team had just three hits, Fredericton for a total of six bases and St. Croix for four. The Pets had three errors, one of which figured in the scoring of the only Calais-St. Stephen run. Vance, the St. Croix first-baseman, made both the visitors' errors and the second one let Bert White reach first and start the circuit which finished with the winning run.
