DRIVES ON ST. JOHN WILL ALL COME OUT THIS YEAR

Lumber Hung at Priestly Rapids Safe in Madawaska Limits—Drive of Four Million on Little Black Is in Doubt

Arthur L. Noble and Guy Morrison who had been with the drives on the Upper St. John River, arrived here last night, having left the drives Tuesday night. They report that driving conditions are good and that prospects are that the lumber on the river will all come out safely. Mr. Noble stated that the only doubtful drive was that of Jack Dickie, on the Little Black River. That drive consists of 4,000,000 feet for Randolph & Baker and with conditions as they are it is probable that it will be brought out. Tuesday night the drive, which had been hung at Priestly Rapids, was at the head of Big Rapids in the limits of the Madawaska Driving Company. This drive is composed of lumber of several operators owned by Murray & Gregory, Stetson & Cutler, the St. John Lumber Company and others. W. J. Noble is still with the drive.

A crew was sent back to bring out 1,500,000 feet of lumber on the Big Black River and that lumber is expected to reach the limits of the Madawaska Driving Company by Friday night at the latest and possibly tonight.

On the Allegash, Cunliffe's drive is all out and Michaud's drive is expected to be out by Friday night.

LEAVING FOR DETROIT.
