CITY ELECTIONS

The Election for Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Fredericton for the ensuing year will be held on MONDAY 10th DAY OF MARCH NEXT at the following places viz: Division No. 1.—For all voters residing or owning property above the centre line of Carleton Street, prolonged, at or near the City Hall in the said City.

Division No. 2.—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City not included in Division No. 1., at or near the County Court House in the said City. Polls will be opened at the above named places at nine o'clock a.m., of the said day of Election, and will close at the hour of four o'clock p.m. of the same day.

Nominations for the office of Mayor or Aldermen must be filed in the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, on or before four o'clock on MONDAY the 3rd day of MARCH next, and must be signed by at least two qualified Electors and the signatures attested to under oath.

Forms for Nomination may be procured at the City Clerk's office. A Certificate of the City Treasurer showing that all Rates and Taxes of the Candidate have been paid within the time required by law must be attached to each Nomination Paper.

PLEBISCITE

At the same time and place the Electors are requested by resolution of the City Council to express their preference of one of the following methods of selecting a Police Commission:

1. Shall the City Council continue to appoint from among the Aldermen a Police Commission?
2. Shall the Police Commission be elected by a vote of the Citizens in the same manner as the Mayor and Aldermen?

THE LATEST FAD
IN LONDON

Many fashionable women in London now wear clothes in harmony with the colors of their canine pets. Thus a woman will wear grey or ash when she goes out for a walk with her great Dane, or a deep colored fabric if she is to be accompanied by her Irish setter. The wire-haired dog call for rough surfaced woolly costumes. Carriage robes are beginning to match the dogs that go riding. But some women are going to the other extreme, dressing in contrast to the dog—a red dog and a garnet gown, a yellow dog and a blue hat, etc. The Daily Mail suggests that the next step will be to breed dogs to match the dresses.

For the dog show held recently some of the prize canines had traveling boxes of carved fancy goods with elaborate metal mountings, or of the finest leather with shuttered windows. Some of the show cases were of glass, silk-upholstered, with pillows of down and miniature bedsteads and bed clothes. Other pens at the show had lace curtains tied back with silk or satin ribbons or with hangings of silk worked with Oriental designs or with embroidered hangings bearing the dog's name. Many pens were furnished with small skin rugs.

As for the dogs themselves, many of them had enormous bows of silk or satin, silver, gold and jewelled collars, bearing medallions on which were the names or portraits of the dogs. Pens were equipped with perfume sprays, toilet cases and lunch baskets. There were also kennel maids in uniform.

In marked contrast Queen Alexandra's dogs were bare of everything except collars, the sides of their pens were stuffed with straw and plain canvas was hung up to keep the draughts.

later date in an automobile and could not see where one cent of money had been spent on it.

Mr. Lockhart said that he believed the gentlemen referred to had given the best services he could in the interest of the province and had made considerable improvement in this road.

Mr. Carson said that hon. members had heard a great deal of talk of the piece of road from the Marsh Bridge to the Kings County line which was not over eight miles in length but it had been a continual drain on the government to keep this road up.

The House took recess at six o'clock.

EVENING SESSION

On the item of \$3,200 for Travelling Expenses, Members of the Executive Council:

Mr. Stewart (Northumberland) asked for information as to the basis on which the travelling expenses were corrupted. He found that the expenditures last year were less than that amount. In the bill relating to the Executive Council provision was made for the payment of members, when in actual attendance at the meetings of the Executive Council. He wanted to know whether the payments were made on a mileage or daily basis.

Hon. Mr. Flemming said the inquiry of his Hon. friend for Northumberland was a proper one, and that Hon. members would find on reference to page 50 of the public accounts that the expenditure of \$2815 for travelling expenses covered all the travelling expenses of Members of the Executive Council, and if they would find that the expenditure in this connection was less than for many years past. The travelling expenses were computed on the basis of so much per day for the days the members were actually engaged in public business. So far as he was personally concerned, he was practically engaged 313 days in the year on public business, and he could say the expenses did not begin to cover what he paid out.

Progress was reported and supply was made the order of the day for Monday next.

Hon. Mr. Flemming said that tomorrow the time would again expire for introduction of private bills, he proposed to move then that the time should be extended until Monday next and after that there would be no further extensions.

The House adjourned at 9 o'clock.

TO PROBE ALLEGED
OLEO FRAUDS

Chicago, Ill., March 5—In response to the summons of United States Judge Landis a special federal grand jury was impaneled today for the sole purpose of investigating alleged gigantic frauds in connection with the payment of the oleomargarine tax in the Chicago districts. That extensive frauds have been practised by some of the near-butler manufacturers has been a matter of gossip for several years past. It is now estimated that the Inland Revenue Department has lost more than \$1,000,000 by such frauds.

When oleomargarine is frankly sold as such, without the use of deceptive coloring matter to make it resemble butter, the federal tax is 4 cent per pound. When coloring is used the tax is 16 cents per pound. The manufacturers, it is said, have found it exceedingly profitable to use secret coloring matters and still pay only the 4 cent tax.

Among the large concerns to be investigated are Armour and Company, United States Butterine Company, Schwarzschild and Sulzberger, the Moxley Company, the G. H. Hammond Company and the Friedman Manufacturing Company.

AT ATLANTA

Atlanta, Ga., March 6—Delegates from all over the south gathered here today to participate in the fifteenth annual Bible Conference. The conference embraces all Protestant denominations. The sessions will continue ten days and will be addressed by a number of religious workers of wide prominence.

CANADIAN SEED GROWERS MEET

Ottawa, Ont., March 6—A large attendance marked the opening here today of the ninth annual convention of the Canadian Seed Growers' Association. Discussion of the annual reports of the several officers occupied today's sessions. Tomorrow the discussions will deal with the question of producing seeds of field roots and vegetables in Canada instead of having to import them from other countries, as at present.

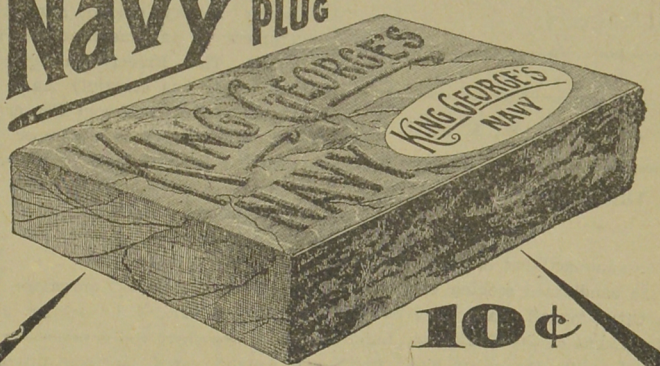
