## ST. JOHN SUBURBAN RY. BILL BEFORE COMMITTEE

made to them to extend their lines into the country districts, nothing had really been done. He reviewed the charter that had been given to the St. John Railway Co. and contended that they had no exclusive right to a franchise over all the streets of the City of St. John and of the counties of Kings and St. John. The only exclusive franchise they had was over streets on which the rails had been laid.

Mr. Hanson followed Mr. Hazen and argued at length against the claim set up by the St. John Street Railway Co. that their franchise was exclusive and claimed that such a contention was absurd. The common people wanted this railway built, and the only ones that were opposing it was this company in St. John, which was nothing more or less than a monopoly. Mr. Cushman spoke briefly corroborating the remarks of the previous speakers and said that the company was one that had the ability to put through successfully such an undertaking.

### THE OTHER SIDE.

Mr. Taylor replied on behalf of the St. John Street Railway Co. He took up different sections of the bill and discussed them. It had been most skillfully drawn but it was not a business proposition. The key-note was to get some kind of a charter which might interfere with the present railway. There was nothing in the bill providing work must be begun at any specified time and there was no penalty attached if the work was not undertaken. The charter was really everlasting and the act on its face gave evidence of the lack of its bona fides. He said it was the intention of the present company to make extensions to Kane's Corner and to Fernhill Cemetery and on the West Side out as far as the residence of Mr. James Manchester.

Mr. Wilson asked if the company intended to build to Millidgeville.

Mr. Taylor said, yes, if certain hindrances existing at the present time could be overcome. He claimed that the franchise was exclusive and that the shareholders took stock in the company clearly with this understanding. This was an effort to compel the St. John Street Railway Co. to sell out and to sell out to Seligman & Co. of the States.

Mr. Harrison said that this company had not demonstrated any good faith, as they did not show how such a company could ever make such an undertaking pay. He spoke of the extensions the present company intended making and the work, as Mr. Taylor had said, would be begun in the spring.

### BONDHOLDERS' POSITION.

Mr. Guthrie appeared on behalf of the Royal Trust Co. for a number of bondholders. These bondholders had purchased bonds of the St. John Street Railway Co. amounting to \$1,000,000 and these purchasers had bought under the belief that the company had an exclusive franchise and the bonds showed this on their face. It would certainly be doing a great injustice to these men if this exclusive franchise was taken away.

Continuing, Mr. Guthrie urged that in the bill as presented there was no provision for the new company to place a deposit to show their bona fides, nothing to show when they would start operations or when they would complete them.

Chairman Slipp—"The committee will certainly see that such a provision is put in."

### PROMOTERS' REPLY

Mr. Hazen is opening the reply for the promoters of the bill said that in reply to questions by Hon. Mr. Wilson he would like to say that the promoters were willing to have any reasonable provision placed in the bill to have work commenced and carried on within a reasonable time, but that they did not wish to put up a deposit unless it was absolutely necessary, as they wanted the money to carry on actual operations. Mr. Hanson said that objection had been taken that there had been no limit placed on the bond issue. He said he felt quite sure that the company would be willing to have a section inserted in the bill limiting that.

Premier Flemming asked Mr. Hanson how he would meet the objection put forward by the bondholders of the present company that the granting of this new charter would interfere with their rights.

Mr. Hanson replied that the bill could be amended so that these bondholders would be protected, and he thought they should be protected.

Premier Flemming asked Mr. J. M. Robinson what he had to say to the argument advanced that where these lines should happen to run parallel it would be to the detriment of the present company.

Mr. Robinson replied that it was not at all probable. The company would not build a line anywhere parallel to the present line.

After some discussion the Committee adjourned to meet in private to consider the bill.

## N. Y. DOCTORS

Dr. Friedmann has been barred from making general use of his discovery because he holds no state license as a practicing physician. The sanction of the health authorities now gives any city hospital the privilege of making the German specialist a resident physician on its staff.

The New York County Medical Society, which protested against tests because Dr. Friedmann held no license, will not stand in the way, if any hospital appoints the Berlin doctor a resident physician, who under the law, does not need a state license.

### FORCED TO QUIT HOTEL

Dr. Friedmann today left the fashionable hotel where he has made his headquarters in this city. The manager notified him that he could continue as a guest, but must establish medical offices elsewhere. It was explained to Dr. Friedmann that the hotel had been overrun with sufferers from tuberculosis since the published reports that he was to make general tests of his serum. Dr. Friedmann gave up his apartments without making known where he was going. This was before the board of health announced its sanction for him to make a test.

Dr. S. J. Benoit of the Notre Dame Hospital, Lowell, Mass., visited Dr. Friedmann and asked him to make demonstrations of his treatment in that hospital. Dr. Friedmann held the offer in abeyance.

Charles E. Finlay the broker who has interested himself in the German physician, said that Ottawa, Canada, "has offered Friedmann the freedom of the city" if he will make tests there.

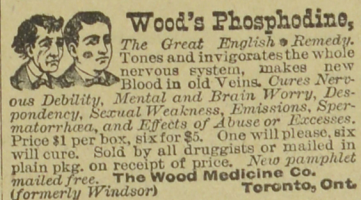
