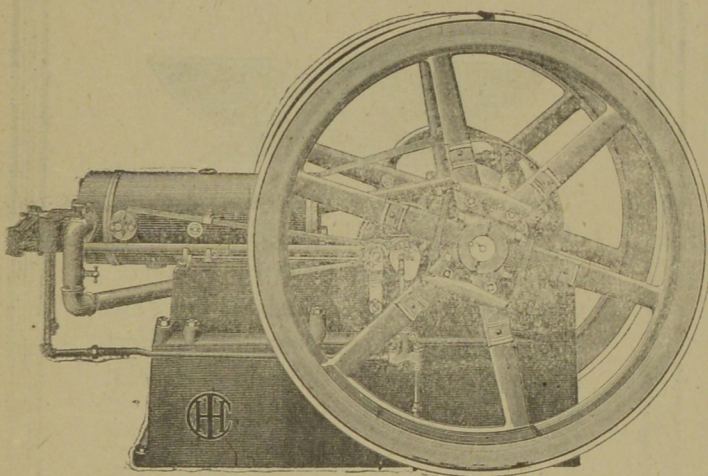

Fredericton Won 6 to 0---Comedy Features by Mike Murphy---Visitors Outclassed at all Times---Goal-Keepers Both Played Good Hockey---Marysville vs St. Stephen Tonight

St. Stephen Thistles played here last night against Fredericton and were shut out 6 to 0. The visiting team is reported not to be at full strength and had nothing startling to offer last night. The Thistles were not dangerous at any stage and the only question was how large Fredericton's score would be. The home team scored four times in the first half and twice in the second. The Thistles worked hard in the second half to escape a shutout but failed to score.

The game was a return to seven men hockey and Mike Murphy who has just completed a season with the New Glasgow Cubs was holding down the cover point position. Mike's chief duty was to furnish the puck to the St. Stephen end on several occasions, however, and it was on his pass that Galloway scored the sixth goal. In the net "Tart" Titus played his usual star game and George Walker at point was prominent at all stages. Fred Wade was on at rover to fill out the team and did well. Alex Galloway at centre although handicapped by a sore foot played his usual steady game. On the wings, McLean and Arnold played hard aggressive hockey. Individual playing was the rule generally among the forwards.

For the Thistles Middlemiss was easily the best performer. The first two goals were shoved past him when he was napping but after that he guarded his net well. His defence players afforded him little protection and Fredericton's other goals were scored on short shots. The St. Stephen forwards attempted practically no combination and were up against a line that out-played them. Barter, Carter and Lee were the best of the quartette but all resorted to long shots instead of going in on the net.

SCORING IN DETAIL

Walker scored Fredericton's first goal after two minutes of play. He got the puck well up the ice and skated down the ice and well in on the St. Stephen net tallying on a side-shot.

Two minutes later Fred Wade scored on a long shot from centre ice that he sent through a bunch of forwards finding the net before Middlemiss saw the puck.
