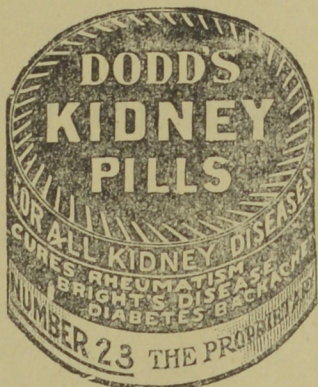

brought over the Canada Eastern
branch of the Intercolonial, and one
of the heaviest ever brought to this
city, reached here this week. It was

rails for the Valley Railway and general
merchandise.

Brought to land, the Aquitania
would dwarf great works of which
man has long been prone to boast.
The Washington monument in the
United States capital, whose 555 feet
was for years the world's record for
high construction, would make only
a fair prop for the new steamer lean-
ing against it. The big thing of the
sea would overtop the famous Wool
worth building in New York City by
more than 100 feet.

The speed of the new vessel will be
about 23 knots an hour. This is con-
siderably less than the records of
some of the transatlantic liners now
in service is considered fast enough
for all practical purposes. The in-
terior furnishings and decorations of
the Aquitania are planned on the
most lavish scale, and she will in every
way merit the description of a
floating city. She will have accom-
modation for 650 first class passen-
gers, 740 second class, and 2400 steer-
age passengers. How prettily the new
vessel will exceed all others in the
nature of the passenger accommoda-
tions is shown by the fact that the
first class staterooms are to be 50
per cent. larger than the customary
size.

With so much space available fea-
tures are possible that have never be-
fore been introduced. There will be a
choice of dining rooms, a restaurant,
grill, tea room, tea garden, rathskel-
ler, palm garden, women's salons in
different decorative periods, swim-
ming pool, Turkish baths, gymnas-
ium and tennis courts. An entirely
new feature will be a completely
equipped theatre. It is said that a
trical company with a repertoire
of plays will be provided for the
vessel by a New York manager.

The Aquitania will be as complete
in her safety devices as in her luxur-
ious equipment. The number of her
life-boats and rafts will meet all the
requirements of the new regulations
of the British Board of Trade, while
the number of her watertight com-
partments will be greater than those
of any vessel now afloat. An auto-
matic device on the bridge will con-
trol the great steel doors separating
the compartments, making it pos-
sible for a single hand to close them
all in case of danger. Furthermore
the system will include an electrical
indicator by which the officer on the
bridge cannot fail to detect any de-
fect in the working of the safety
devices. Still another set of safety
devices will guard against fire in
every part of the ship. In addition,
the vessel will be equipped with a
powerful wireless system which will
enable her to keep in constant com-
munication with the land during the
entire passage across the Atlantic.

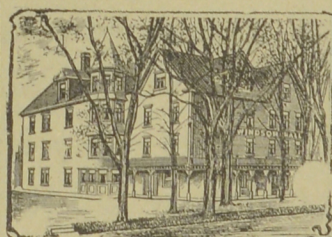
