CONNECTION WITH  
G. T. P. AT MCGIVNEY  
AT LAST OF MONTH

C. M. Rideout, General Traffic Manager of G. T. P. for New Brunswick Had Conference With Local People

Mr. C. M. Rideout of Edmundston, general traffic manager for the New Brunswick division of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway conferred with members of the Board of Trade and other citizens yesterday afternoon with regard to traffic matters in connection with his line. A considerable amount of freight traffic already has developed on the Edmundston-Moncton section and it is expected that merchants of this city will add considerably to that traffic by means of shipments to Plaster Rock, Grand Falls, Edmundston and other points in the northern part of the province.

Mr. Rideout stated yesterday that the objection raised by Fredericton people that no connection was furnished with I. R. C. trains at McGivney under the present G. T. P. train service would be overcome by a change of time-table to go into effect upon March 30. Under the new arrangement passengers from points on the G. T. P. will be able to reach Fredericton on the I. R. C. express which arrives shortly before noon. Connection will be furnished with both east-bound and west bound trains on the G. T. P.

**FREIGHT BUSINESS GROWING**  
The following from the Moncton Transcript gives some idea of the class of freight business done on the new line:—

The Bangor and Aroostook Railway is giving a big impetus to the freight business of the New Brunswick section of the National Transcontinental Railway (G. T. P.). The accommodation train which arrived here from Edmundston on Saturday evening brought four cars of logs consigned to different local firms. People wanted to get their potatoes to Montreal, so they were sending them over the Transcontinental as far as Edmundston, and thence via the Temiscouata Railway. The greater part of these shipments come from Grand Falls and stations in those vicinities. Conductor McManus also stated that the snow was heavy along the line. This was what delayed the train Saturday night. They had found it necessary to run a combined plow and flanger ahead of the engine.

## OSTRICHES FOR EXHIBITION.

Secretary W. S. Hooper of the Fredericton Exhibition, announced this morning that a contract had been signed for a pen of ostriches as an amusement feature of the exhibition of 1913. About twenty ostriches will be in the pen. They will come from the Cawston Ostrich Farm, Pasadena, California.

SANITARIUM  
AT RIVERGLADE TO  
OPEN IN WEEK

Applications for Admission Already Received—Dr. Townsend, Superintendent, Here Yesterday—Says Public Not Aware of Opportunity

Dr. Townsend, Superintendent of the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium at Riverglade, Westmorland County, was in the city yesterday to inaugurate here the system under which consultations and examinations in connection with tuberculosis cases may be held. Dr. Townsend was at Victoria Public Hospital during the day but his services were not called into requisition. In conversation with a reporter of The Mail last night Dr. Townsend stated that this state of affairs in his opinion was due to the fact that the people of New Brunswick were not yet alive to the importance of combating the disease of tuberculosis or to the fact that a sanitarium existed to which tubercular patients can be admitted or that an opportunity for consultation and examination existed.

## EDUCATION NEEDED.

"The people," said he, "must be educated to believe that the proper time to fight tuberculosis is at the time the existence of the disease is first suspected and not six months or a year afterward. I will be at Victoria Public Hospital on the first Wednesday of each month from the present time on and I will be there to advise and examine in connection with the disease."

## TO OPEN IN A WEEK.

Dr. Townsend stated that the sanitarium at Riverglade would be ready for the treatment of cases in about a week. A number of applications for admission have been received and the institution will open with quite a number of patients.
