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A PERMANENT POLICY

Senator Loughheed, the Government Leader in the Senate, admitted the whole Tory principle of Empire centralization with a permanent policy of contribution from Canada when he introduced the Borden Naval Bill into the Senate. His speech was one long hysterical outburst of emergency, the raising of the ghost of the German menace and a picture of the horrors that would come if Great Britain should lose command of the seas. In every possible way he tried to excite his hearers to a belief that there was imminent peril and that the Empire could only be saved by the immediate addition of Canada's \$35,000,000 to the \$250,000,000 or more voted this year by the British Government for naval purposes. Had his arguments been good his remedy was pitifully inadequate.

Senator Loughheed went further and tried to show not only that there was an emergency, but that the Liberal policy was inadequate to meet the conditions in any way, that it was not meeting Canada's obligations to the Empire, that it was inciting a policy of separation and would notify all the world to attack Great Britain because Canada proposed to build man, equip and maintain her own part of the Imperial fleet and give her sons as well as her money, ready for the command to defend the Empire whenever necessary.

Fortunately facts do not bear out Senator Loughheed's philippics. There is no emergency. The German peril is as extinct as the Dodo. Within the past week the world has seen Britain's king received with extraordinary honors at the German capital within the past month the world has seen the German head of the Admiralty declaring that Germany has no designs upon Great Britain and was perfectly content to admit the necessity of Great Britain preserving a 60 p.c. superiority over the German fleet. The British Empire has heard her First Lord of the Admiralty declaring in the Imperial Parliament that Great Britain was as prepared as ever to meet any hostile combination that might be formed, and that the naval preparations were amply sufficient to indefinitely secure her command of the seas. As to Senator Loughheed's declaration that the Liberal policy was in effect disloyal and inadequate, this is refuted by Mr. Winston Churchill who said in the Imperial Parliament, as reported in the London Times, May 1st, 1913:

"THE DIFFERENCE IN METHOD WHICH SEPARATES THE PROPOSALS OF MR. BORDEN'S GOVERNMENT FROM THOSE OF THAT FAR-SEEING IMPERIAL STATESMAN, SIR WILFRID LAURIER ARE NOT OF VITAL IMPORTANCE. . . . From a wider standard than any which the Admiralty can occupy, THE PRINCIPLE OF CANADA COMING FORWARD FOR THE WORLD WIDE NAVAL DEFENCE OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE IS OF INESTIMABLE VALUE, AND THAT IS THE PRINCIPLE UPON WHICH I UNDERSTAND LIBERALS AND CONSERVATIVES IN CANADA ARE AT ONE."

It is evident that Winston Churchill understands the position both in Canada and Great Britain far better than does Senator Loughheed.

The announcement comes from Ottawa that the proposed Andover Grand Falls section of the St. John Valley Railway will not be constructed, but that running rights will be secured over the Canadian Pacific. A movement is also on foot to have the road enter St. John by the west side, which means that the C.P.R. rails would be utilized from Westfield or Welsford. The C.P.R. has a strong pull with both the Flemming and Borden governments and can get about anything it wants. In this connection it may be noted that a former C.P.R. official is now general manager of the government railways.

THE SENATE VOTE

As a matter of record, it may be interesting to publish the actual vote in the Senate on Sir George Ross' amendment to the Naval Bill. The vote was along straight party lines, with the exception of the aged Senator Ellis of St. John, and Senator Montplaisir, who voted with the Opposition. The only pair announced was that of Senator J. A. Gray of Toronto, who would have voted for the amendment, with Senator Owens of Montreal, who would have voted against it.
