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STEFANSSON

meet at Point Barrow about August 1. The subsequent plans depend entirely upon meteorological conditions. If an easterly wind should prevail, the expedition will be able to sail around the point without delay. But, if the wind should be from the West, it is likely that the ice would be packed so tight that the two ships would have to wait until January of next year before being able to start on their exploring tour.

If the wind and weather conditions should be favorable, the expedition will reach Herschel Island in two days' journey from Point Barrow. There the expedition will be divided. One party, under the command of Dr. R. M. Anderson, will remain on the island, establish a base of supplies and devote itself to its task, the study of the blond Eskimos, and the geological exploration of the island. The party will have at its service the smaller of the two ships of the expedition, while Commander Stefansson in the Kurluk will push northward in search of the unknown continent. It will follow along the 141st meridian, which divides Alaska from Canada. If there is really such a continent, it is expected that it will be reached within a day's sail. This, of course, depends almost entirely upon the weather conditions. The continent, he will first establish. If Commander Stefansson should find a base of supplies before starting for the interior on an exploring tour. The expedition is well provisioned for several years, but expects to help out the larder by shooting musk oxen, caribous and other animals which are believed to be plentiful in those regions. Even if everything goes well, it is not expected that the expedition will return to civilization before the end of three or four years. The smaller vessel will make an annual trip to Alaska to keep up communication between the explorers and their friends.

Contingencies Committee said that there would be enough in the contingent fund to pay for a new floor.

FIRE DEPARTMENT DRIVERS

Ald. Weddall said that he had no desire to encroach on the department of any committee but he thought provision should be made to give the Fire Department drivers opportunity for recreation. He thought arrangements should be made whereby the drivers should have Sundays free the city furnishing substitutes.

It was pointed out that last summer the drivers were given days off for recreation.

Ald. Weddall said he understood that was to enable them to attend ball games. He wished to give them an opportunity to enjoy spiritual benefit. He embodied his suggestion in a motion which was seconded by Ald. Rogers and carried.

CHILDREN ON STREETS

Ald. Weddall further pointed out that there was a city by-law which provided that children under twelve years of age should not be on the streets after 9 p. m. unless accompanied by parents or guardians. There was no attempt to enforce this by-law and it was foolish to have city ordinances that were dead-letters. He understood that in St. Stephen a similar by-law was enforced.

His Worship Mayor Hooper stated that the Police Commission had considered the enforcement of that very by-law. The point had been raised however that the City Council had no right to make such a by-law.

The City Clerk stated that an amendment made by the Attorney General of Canada and also a provincial enactment did away with that objection.

MAIL IMPROVEMENT

On the motion of Ald. Rogers a special committee composed of Aldermen Rogers, Osborne and Weddall was appointed by His Worship to interview the authorities with a view of having residents of the city south of Charlotte Street given a better mail delivery service than they have at present.

His Worship in connection with the motion stated that he had been informed that the early afternoon delivery of mail was inconvenienced and would be changed.

The Council then adjourned.

The government had already aided this road with a bond guarantee of \$35,000 a mile.

Finance Minister White justified the advance on the ground that the C.N.R. had been less helped than the C.P.R. or the G.T.P.

Hon. George P. Graham said that if this aid were granted there should be some things required of the company. It should be compelled to submit its rates on the portion of the line in British Columbia to the jurisdiction of the Dominion Railway Board. Instead of a subsidy the company should be loaned the money and compelled to pay it back. The government should have representation on the board of directors.

William German declared that the real controller of the Canadian Northern situation was Z. A. Lash of Toronto, who got up the round robin against reciprocity, securing the name of Mr. White among others.

"Where were you?" asked Premier Borden.

"I was not with them," said Mr. German. "I was against reciprocity all right because I did not believe in it but I stood on my own feet. Z. A. Lash was also the man who made Mr. White minister of finance. Now he is coming for his reward."

The declaration produced an immense sensation but neither Premier Borden nor Mr. White rose to challenge it.

Mr. German said that the group behind the Canadian Northern were building the line for themselves with the money of the people. When the C.P.R. came to parliament for money they were able to show that the men promoting it had put every dollar of their money into the enterprise.

"Why don't MacKenzie & Mann put their own money into the road for a while," said Mr. German. "And for a change," said Mr. Oliver.

The matter remains as it was.


