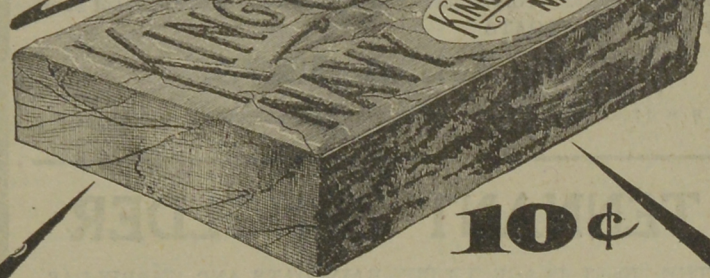

Calais, Me., June 3—The peerless players representing Calais and St. Stephen in the Maine & New Brunswick Baseball League met their Waterloo on the St. Stephen driving park this afternoon when they defeated by a score of 9 to 2. Fredericton started the trouble but failed to make a run in the first while Vance, of the Calais-Stephen nine, reached home on a fumble by Fryer. In the second inning Calais—St. Stephen was blanked, but Callahan scored on a hit by Murphy. The balloon went up the third inning, Fredericton securing five runs.

Howard, who opened the ball for Calais—St. Stephen, was replaced by Conley in this inning and White connected with him for a grounder right into the mitt of Vance.
