



## R. & O. INTERESTS ARE NOW DIVIDED

"A house divided against itself," gathered from reports on the "Street" today is the position in which the new interests seeking R. and O. control find themselves today. It is believed that trouble has arisen over the passing of the bill now before the Dominion House. Some of the big interests in R. and O. are against the increased capital.

Mr. James Carruthers returned to the city today from Ottawa and declined to say anything on yesterday's report that he had been asked to accept the presidency of R. and O. under the new control. It is very possible he will decline, however. It seems to be generally thought that Sir Rodolphe Forget will again be president, but it is almost certain that several of the present directors will "walk the plank."

Mr. Claude G. Bryan, representative of the Furness interests arrived in the city last night. This afternoon it is understood there will be a meeting of the interests seeking control. Mr. Playfair, head of the western group being in the city for the purpose. A definite stand on the new bill and other plans for re-organization will be discussed.

It is understood that at the annual meeting February 19, the annual report will show earnings for the past year at 92 per cent.

## ATTITUDE OF DEMOCRATS ON THE CANAL TOLLS

Washington, Feb. 6—President-elect Wilson's attitude on Panama Canal tolls and free passage for American coastwise ships is expected to have an important bearing upon the Senate's action on the Root amendment proposing the repeal of the free ships provision of the bill passed last August.

While the Democratic national platform advocated the remission of tolls to coastwise vessels a number of leaders in the anti-free passage fight think some Democratic may be willing to vote for the repeal of the provision now, in order that the entire subject may be left open when Mr. Wilson takes office.

The Root amendment will be taken up by the Senate Committee on Inter-oceanic Canals tomorrow. Senator Root will be heard later. It is possible that other hearings will be given to advocates and opponents of the provision.

While the advocates of the Root amendment do not count upon securing enough votes in the committee to favorably report it, the proposal probably will come before the Senate either through a minority report or upon the demand of some Senator.

## SHOCKING CRIME NEAR WINDSOR, N. S.

Windsor, N.S., Feb. 9—A shocking murder was committed a few miles from Windsor this afternoon at Belmont, Hants County, when Mrs. Sanford, a widow was killed with an axe by her son Henry who is supposed to be of unsound mind. Three hours after the murder the young man who is only 21 was arrested on Water Street here by R. Conlon, policeman. The news was telephoned to W. R. Christie, crown prosecutor Windsor, after the brutal deed was done. He at once notified Policeman Conlon who is also the town jailer, to be on the look out for the man, who had intimated his intention of coming to Windsor to give himself up. Mr. Conlon started out to look for the man, and seeing a man coming along Water Street that answered to the description of the man wanted, asked him if his name was

## SUFFRAGETTES TO HIKE TO THE NATIONAL CAPITAL

(Continued from page 1)

General Rosalie Gardiner Jones, who also commanded the "army" which invaded Albany a short time ago, had gathered valuable experience during that march, which enabled her to arrange all details of the present trip with the judgment of an experienced campaigner. Her general orders in reference to the "hike" were brief, business-like and to the point. She made it clear to those wishing to take part in the trip that ball dresses, evening clothes, etc., would be decidedly de trop and that no marcher would be permitted to take along more baggage than could easily be stowed away in an ordinary suit-case. For the sake of uniformity it was ordered that every one of the soldiers would have to wear a pilgrim cloak and hood and carry a knapsack and staff. The knapsack will be large enough to hold one or two pairs of extra woollen stockings, adhesive plaster, vaseline, absorbent cotton and a few other things which may be desirable and useful in cases of emergency. Each marcher will be permitted one medium size bag or suit-case, which will be carried on a baggage wagon forming the pack-train of the "army."

The "hikers" expect to reach Elizabeth, N.J., by tomorrow evening, New Brunswick, N.J., on the evening of Feb. 13, Trenton on the 14th, Bristol, N.J., on the 15th, Burlington, Pa., on the 16th, Philadelphia on the evening of Feb. 17; Chester, Pa., on the 18th and Wilmington, Del., on the evening of Feb. 19. The marchers will rest the following day at Wilmington and will start again on the morning of the 21st, making their next stop at Newark, Del., the next evening. They are to reach North East, Md., on the 22nd; Elavre de Grace, Md., on the 23rd; Abington, Md., on the 24th; Case, Md., on the 25th and Baltimore on the 26th. There they will rest until the morning of February 28, when they expect to continue their journey, reaching Laurel, Md., that same evening and Washington on the evening of March 1.

It is expected that there will be great doings in Washington on March 3, the day before the inauguration. According to reports there will be several thousand suffrage enthusiasts from all parts of the country gathered in the national capital on that occasion to take part in the great national demonstration and parade planned by the suffragists of the country. The principal event of a spectacular nature will be the big parade on March 3, in which ten thousand suffragettes and suffragists are expected to take part. One of the special features will be a large body of petticoat cavalry under the leadership of Miss Inez Milholland. Miss Gladys Hinchley will impersonate Joan of Arc and will be mounted, in full armor, upon a snow-white charger.

## MAY BE REPRESENTED AT WASHINGTON

Ottawa, Feb. 7—At the banquet of the Dominion Marine Association at the Chateau Laurier, last night, the Hon. J. D. Hazen, in the course of a speech, expressed the opinion that much good will be accomplished by the appointment of a Canadian representative on the British Embassy at Washington. Such an official, he thought, would be of great assistance in connection with the various matters, which are the subject of negotiation between the two countries.

Mr. Hazen also expressed his warm sympathy with the movement to encourage steel ship building in Canada, and also stated that Canada would co-operate with all organizations on the Great Lakes in resisting the efforts of the Chicago drainage authorities to reduce the level of the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence.

The Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways, in speaking of transportation matters, said that it is proposed that ultimately the gates of the new Welland Canal shall have a depth of thirty feet. They will not be made thirty feet deep now, but will be so constructed that they can be enlarged at a later date.


