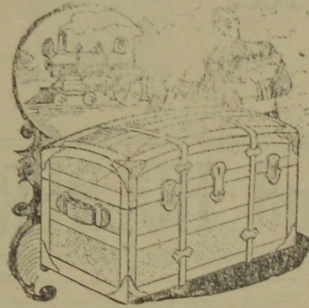

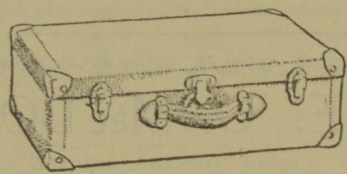

Unsatisfactory Hockey Match Last Night

DAVE MOREY
COACHING PITCHERS
AT DARTMOUTH

Will Have to Develop Entire New
Outfield for the Green---Hard at
Work

Hanover, N. H., Feb. 9.—The Dartmouth baseball team has already started work for the season. "Dave" Morey, star half-back on the football team for three years, is captain of the nine and is in charge of the practice at present.

The entire west wing of the Alumni Gymnasium is now the Mecca every afternoon for the baseball men as a full-sized infield has been laid out there.

Five men from last year's team will not be available this spring. An entirely new infield will have to be found by Coach Woods, as well as a third baseman to fill Rollins' place, and a shortstop to take Howard Fahey's place. The latter was signed at the close of the collegiate season by Connie Mack, who has loaned him to Sacramento for this year.

Capt. Morey, himself a first-string pitcher, is devoting his time exclusively to battery candidates. For pitchers there are Harold E. Weare of Cape Heddick, Me., Edgar A. Curtis of Portland, William W. Washburn of Hanover, N.H., James C. Taft of Greenville, N.H., John R. Willard of Randolph, Mass., Leon P. Tuck of Winchester, Mass.; Howells K. Hallett of St. Louis, and John T. Peppard of Plymouth, N.H. Of the squad of backstops there are Clarence Wanamaker of Melrose Highlands, Mass.; Bernard Spillane of North Easton, Mass.; Frederick A. Alden of Vergennes, Vt.; Lester D. Castle of Chicago, and Arthur I. Donahue of Somerville, Mass.

Coach Woods has sent word to Capt. Morey that he will come to Hanover February 22 and until the 1st of March he will devote his time to the battery men. After the latter date, all the baseball men will be ordered to report for daily practice in the gymnasium.

Unless this is an unusual spring, the squad will be unable to get outside until after it returns from the Easter recess. The first game on the annual trip south will be against Seton Hall April 11, but the first contest in Hanover will not take place until April 23 with Colby.

McGRAW MADE OFFER

FOR PITCHER HENDRIX

Pittsburg, Feb. 9.—Manager McGraw of the New York Giants thinks so well of Claude Hendrix, the Pirate pitcher, that he has offered four players and \$5000 for the pitcher who led the National League last season.

Whether McGraw's offer was only a "feeler" or was made in good faith is not known here, but the offer was made to Barney Dreyfuss and was turned down.

McGraw did not mention the names of those he intended turning over to Pittsburg.

Hendrix is 23 years old. He cost the Pittsburg club 25 cents—the price of a telegram ordering him to report for trial. He has been two years in the majors and is about the best hitting pitcher in the league. In the outfield he is a star.

U. N. B. and Chatham Played Six-men Game as Compromise—Teams Rather Mixed up—Score Was Chatham 5, U. N. B. 3—Scrapping a Feature of Match—Game of no Value as Indication of Red and Black Strength

Chatham and U.N.B. pulled off a curious match of hockey at the Arctic Rink. Incidentally Chatham won 5 to 3 but as a means of getting a line of the ability of the Red and Black to do anything in the Intercollegiate League the match was a dismal failure. The two teams tried to play six men hockey without any great degree of success and as the college men were shifted out of their regular positions to a great extent their playing was much affected.

GAME DELAYED

The six-men brand of Canada's great winter sport a la N.H.A., M.P.H.A. and other pro organizations was tried as a compromise. Chatham arrived here short of players yesterday afternoon. They proposed to play "Tart" Titus and Fred McLean of the Fredericton team, Titus in goal and McLean at coverpoint. The collegians let "Tart" pass but could not see why McLean should play. They argued very justly that they were paying Chatham a guarantee to bring a team here not to come with a fraction of a team and pick up substitutes and it may also be remembered that McLean put up hockey of the stellar brand in Saturday night's Fredericton—Marysville combat. As Chatham had Mr. McLean on the ice resplendent in his hockey togs at the hour the game was to start the result was a naturally infringed on the time that should have been given over to playing and the spectators grew rather weary. The Gordian knot was finally severed by the decision to play six-men hockey. As a matter of fact the college team probably would have been more benefited by playing the season men game with Fred McLean on the Chatham line-up. After this delay the carnage began.

THE COLLEGE TEAM

In goal for U.N.B. Frank McGibbon put up a surprisingly good game. His main fault is slow movement on his feet. Barry and Melanson alternated between point and cover. Considering the fact that Barry is a rover he did well. Melanson and he both checked hard and effectively but did not do enough of it. Melanson has the one-hand stick-handling habit known to local experts as "the Martin Butler." It is conducive to graceful carriage while skating but as an aid to safe and sane hockey is a heavy frost. The crowd panned him out for it. The U.N.B. forwards worked hard at all stages but did little passing. At centre Lockary improved as the game went on and showed that his old-time shooting ability still was with him. His experience counts heavily but he was very much off in handling the rubber a fault that most of his team-mates shared. Blaine Pugh after a two-weeks absence nursing a sore ankle was back again playing every minute of the time. He is a big strength to the forwards. On the other wing Ken Machum played a good individual game. He retired slightly hurt in the second half and Lockary took his place, Jack Hipwell going on at centre. Hipwell lacks experience but is expected to improve.

CHATHAM TEAM FAST

Chatham was fast and stick-handled better than U. N. B. Referee Hughes let their forwards get away with a lot of offside play however that helped them out. Their offside loafing became so flagrant however that even the referee, who was as easy-going as possible chased one forward to the bench for it. Veno the hardest working forward on the ice and put lots of ginger into his play. Bellevue also worked hard but was not very effective. Flood was not up to the standard set by his two mates. Synott and Watling made a rattling good pair of defence men but Synott did too much aimless skating with the puck. In the net Titus was as good as ever.

LIVELY SCRAPS

The game in the second half was enlivened by some lively scraps. A free-for-all in the corner near the Chatham goal produced no penalties the players merely being sorted out and induced to resume the game. Pugh and Flood were chased twice by the referee for mixing things. Pugh's pugnacity is in inverse ratio to his avoirdupois and Flood holds the North Shore chopping champion-

ship. When the two came together there were "doin's" and as a result they spent several minutes draped gracefully around the timers' box.

THE DETAILS

Play began at a funeral pace but gradually brightened. Synott drew first blood for Chatham scoring after a combination rush.

It was not till fourteen minutes had elapsed that Chatham scored again. U. N. B. suffered from penalizing and Chatham took advantage of that fact. Bellevue scored the second goal from a mix-up.

Chatham 3, U. N. B. 0.

Lockary broke the ice for the college near the close of the first half. His shot was a high one and fooled Titus. It followed some good combination on the part of U. N. B.

The second half began with U. N. B. working hard to score and roughing things up. Barry began to try rushes and generally succeeded in getting well in on the Chatham net though Synott and Watling were defending well. It was on a pass from Barry that Lockary scored the second goal for U. N. B. and made matters interesting.

Chatham 3, U. N. B. 2.

The college again lost through penalizing and were hard pressed. Flood scored from a scrimmage in front of the net.

Chatham 4, U. N. B. 2.

The Red and Black worked hard for a goal and made Chatham fight. Barry batted the rubber in from a mixup near the Chatham net.

The college team then seemed to ease up and Bellevue ran through and scored on a long shot. That ended the scoring and the game closed with play at the U.N.B. end.
