MEMBERS ARRIVING
FOR THE OPENING
OF LEGISLATURE

Judge Landry, Acting Chief Justice, Will Swear in Members Thursday Morning—No Unusual Features of Opening Ceremonies

Members of the legislature are arriving for the opening of the House of Assembly, which is to take place Thursday afternoon. Premier Fleming, Attorney General Grimmer and Chief Commissioner Morrissey are here today and other members of the government are expected to arrive this evening. The provincial executive will meet tomorrow in preparation for the session of the House. A number of the members of the House are now here but the majority will arrive tomorrow. In the future they are to be known as Members of the Legislative Assembly, a title which is more accurate than the old one of Member of Provincial Parliament. The letters M.L.A. consequently replace M.P.P. It is expected that the majority of the members will live at the Queen Hotel and Barker House, each hotel having provided accommodation for a considerable number.

SEATING ARRANGEMENT.

The seating arrangement on the floor of the House have not yet been settled but will be tomorrow. The portrait of Ex-Lieut. Governor Tweedie has been hung on the walls of the Chamber. Considerable change has been made in this connection. Arrangements with regard to committee rooms, telegraph offices and press rooms are about as before.

OPENING CEREMONY.

The ceremonies attending the opening of the House will be about as last year. The 19th Field Battery of Moncton will fire the salute, the firing party arriving Thursday morning and being quartered at the Barracks. The guard of honor will be furnished by the 1st York Regt. and "H" Company, R.C.R. His Honor the Lieut. Governor will be attended by a military staff, the exact composition of which is not yet known. Thursday afternoon after the opening of the House His Honor the Lieut. Governor will hold a reception at the Queen Hotel.

LET GO WITH WARNING.

Nickolay Horchuk, the foreigner charged with stealing forty dollars from a room-mate, was let go with a severe warning when he appeared in the police court this morning. Counsel for the complainant stated that his client was willing to let matters stand if better behavior was promised. The prisoner was told that he was liable to at least two years' imprisonment for his offense. Samuel Campbell acted as court interpreter.

ST. STEPHEN HORSES ARRIVE

TO BE REPRESENTED
BY COUNSEL BEFORE
UTILITIES COMMISSION

Hearing Re. N. B. Telephone Co., Petition to be at St. John March 26—Board of Trade Executive In Session

The executive of the Fredericton Board of Trade decided at a meeting last night to be represented by counsel at the meeting of the Public Utilities Commission to be held in St. John, March 26, at which the petition of the New Brunswick Telephone Company with regard to the rearrangement of rates and reclassification of its service will be considered. The board received a communication from Mr. F. P. Robinson, secretary of the Public Utilities Commission concerning the protest made by the board against that section of the company's petition which prays that reclassification of rates may be made without notice being given. It was on this communication that the action mentioned was taken.

The resolution of the Gagetown Board of Trade against any change in the route of the St. John & Quebec Railway was endorsed.

A resolution of the Campbellton Board of Trade to the effect that the I. R. C. should continue under government management and that the policy of acquiring the branch lines should be extended was also endorsed.

The executive decided to make a vigorous effort for the collection of membership dues, the board needing money at the present time.

BANKING CHANGE

Mr. A. D. Jaffrey who has been ledger-keeper of the Bank of New Brunswick here for some months has left that bank and will go to St. John tomorrow to take a position with the Merchants' Bank of Canada. Mr. Cunningham of Fairville succeeds him here.

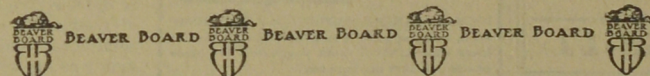
