GIRL ILL-TREATED THEN STRANGLED

Berlin, Aug. 4.—The mystery of the disappearance of Elsie Blumer, a beautiful six-year-old girl of Einbeck, Hanover, whose body was found two weeks ago in a subterranean passage under a building once used as a nursery, with indications that she had been ill-treated and starved for weeks was solved yesterday when the police arrested a man named Wolters, fifty-two years old, who purchased the building and built cottages on the property, in one of which the girl's father, a carpenter, lives with the family.

A post mortem examination showed that the child had lived for weeks after her disappearance on April 1, was ill-treated, starved and killed by strangulation. In looking for clues to the perpetrator of the crime, the police were mystified until they discovered that the subterranean passage where the body was found was closed by a freshly built wall. Traces of food were found near it and the police demolished the wall. They found a continuation of the passage, which led directly to the kitchen of the cottage occupied by Wolters.

Wolters was arrested. It is said he admitted his guilt but later repudiated the confession.

A LITTLE MORE LEEWAY FOR THE AUTOMOBILE

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Aug. 4.—The automobile owners have driven the wedge in a little farther. First they secured permission from the government to run cars on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays in Charlottetown, the territory covering an irregular circle, with a five mile radius. On Monday of this week more territory was thrown open, the road from Charlottetown to the Cliff Hotel, the principal summer hotel for this province. To get this privilege, the autoists canvassed the farmers and got signatures to the petition upon which the government took action. autoists say that the other signatures were secured by purchasing butter-milk at fantastic prices and adopting other means.

There are about a dozen cars now running and their owners are doing their best to placate the farmers. They encourage the latter to bring their horses to town in order to get them broken in and in passing teams they would give pointers to Alphonse and Gaston.

If they succeed in overcoming the present prejudice they will prove themselves diplomats worthy of a royal decoration. The opposition is intensified by the fact that the government promised to keep the ban on the auto if the people by their votes at the annual school meetings, so expressed themselves. The vote was overwhelmingly against the auto. Hence there are many Conservatives who say to the automobile man:

"If you drive in the wedge any farther you will split the government." The anti-autoists quote in defence of their attitude the utterances of the American consul, that the prohibition of the automobile assists, rather than hinders, the tourist traffic that the island is ahead of the times, rather than behind them in shutting the autos out.

A LAW

Be it enacted by the Board of Health of the City of Fredericton, as follows:—

1. Food products intended for human consumption, and generally or frequently eaten without being cooked, and not enclosed in a natural inedible covering or rind, shall not be exposed for sale within or outside of any shop or other place of merchandise situate in the City of Fredericton, unless adequately protected by a suitable covering from flies and other insects, and from the dirt and dust of the place of exposure or street, whereon such place is situate. This By-Law shall however not apply to such food products exposed for sale in the Phoenix Square Market in the said City of Fredericton, during the hours established by law for the continuance of such market.

2. Dressed or partly dressed meat intended for human consumption, shall not be conveyed for commercial purposes over any street or highway of the City of Fredericton, unless efficiently protected by a suitable covering from insects, dust, and exposure to the weather, and such meat shall not be exposed for sale where it is liable to such contamination or injury, unless so protected. The term "Meat" in this By-Law, shall be held to include Fish and all other food products of animal origin liable to contamination or injury by exposure.

3. This By-Law shall come into force on the first day of A. D. 1913. Passed and enacted by the Local Board of Health of the City of Fredericton (District No. 1) this thirty-first day of July, A. D. 1913.
