It was a pitcher's battle between James and Browning, both having fast support. The Easterns accumulated nine hits off the Colby man, while Browning was found for but six, but James was strong in the pinches and pulled out of several holes, when a timely hit would have won for the Easterns.

The Beavers got a run in the first inning, York waiting out for a walk, going down on a pass ball and scoring on Mackin's hit. They scored the second and what proved to be the winning run on well executed squeeze play in the seventh.

Baker started off with a single, Allen singled, McClain was hit by a pitched ball and Baker was forced at the plate on a hit to first by Roberts. Evans pulled off a bunt squeezing Allen home. Browning stopped the rally by fanning out Desmond, who was put in as a pinch hitter.

The Easterns rallied in the ninth with hits by Johnson and Kiah. McManus sent in as pinch hitter, fanned and Browning made a good bid to clean up and fled out to centre-field. The Easterns' run was earned on hits by Pendleton and LeBrun.

The Easterns were much pleased with their treatment at Brownville. Two more games have been arranged one at South Brewer and another at Brownville Junction.

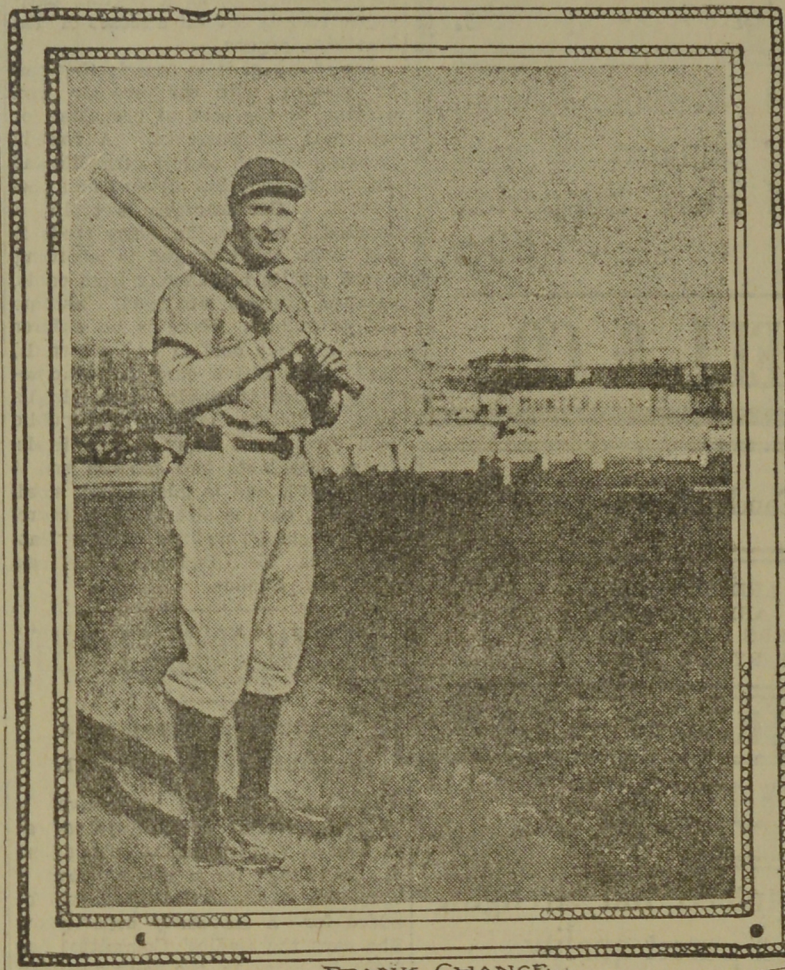

FRANK CHANCE WILL NOT RETIRE FROM GAME

Says Report to that Effect is Untrue--Now Taking a Step to Brace up the Highlanders and Put Them in the Running Next Year--Zeiger to Report Shortly

New York, Aug. 3--Manager Frank Chance of the New York American League team, denied emphatically today the report that he will resign as leader of the Yankees at the close of the present season. Chance was at a loss to explain the rumor, which originated in Los Angeles. He stated that he was perfectly satisfied with the present outlook for the team and the conditions under which he was working.

"I have not the slightest intention of resigning as manager of the New York Club," said Chance. "Instead, I am working and planning to put a real pennant contender into the American League next season. It's slow work, to be sure, for I have to go into the bushes for new material and then develop it for the big league."

"Unless circumstances over which I have no control arise, and I know of nothing of the sort at the present, I shall continue with the New York Club until I close my active baseball career."

"I have no apologies to offer for the showing of the club to date. I

realized from the start that it would have to be entirely rebuilt in order to prove a winner and this task, which cannot be accomplished in a week, is the one which is engaging my entire attention at this time."

"I expect by trade, purchase and draft to gather players who will strengthen weak points on the team, and when I get the combination together we will have a team to be feared."

"In fact, the boys are already beginning to play a fast game. Zeiger will report in a few days and, with two new players whom I expect in a week or ten days, will almost double the strength of the club."

"My relations with President Farrell are most harmonious and the support given both the club and myself by followers of baseball is all that could be desired. I am absolutely satisfied with New York as a baseball and home proposition."

"When I can give the local fans the kind of a team they deserve, my every wish will have been granted. Until that time, talk of my resigning is out of order."

GREAT WESTERN CIRCUIT STARTS AT DECATUR

Decatur, Ill., Aug. 5--The season of the Great Western Circuit of the trotting and pacing meetings was inaugurated at the local track today. Several hundred horses, representing many important stables, are here, and all indications point to a successful meeting.

The Great Western Circuit has mapped out an ambitious schedule for the present season. There will be three solid months of racing, during which time more than a quarter of a million dollars will be distributed in purses. From here the horses will go to Peoria and then to Galesburg. After the Galesburg meeting the circuit will follow a continuous line of State fairs, including those of Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Missouri, Illinois, Texas and Arizona.

JOHNSON AND LANGFORD TO MEET IN AUTUMN

New York, Aug. 4--It is nearly settled that Jack Johnson will battle twenty rounds with Sam Langford in London early in October next. One of the sporting journals from Paris at hand makes this startling announcement:

"Jack Johnson to meet Sam Langford for the championship of the world. Both men are in fine shape for the fight. It will take place in October, in London, England."

Johnson is in Paris at the present time. A private communication from a prominent Parisian promoter says that the negro is "getting to be very much disliked."
