

OPPORTUNITY FOR LIBERALS TO HELP ALONG THE CAUSE

May 7, 1913.

TO THE LIBERALS OF NEW BRUNSWICK:

Efficient organization is the keystone of success in business or politics. The recognition of this fact and the request to their supporters to join in sharing the necessary expense brought success to the Democratic leaders and their party in the United States Presidential elections last year. The funds for legitimate party purposes, such as organization, printing, publicity and travelling expenses, were raised by a popular subscription.

The Liberals of New Brunswick are in need of more thorough organization, of committee work and wider distribution of party literature, for which purposes a considerable sum of money will be required. We believe all loyal supporters of the party will be ready and willing to subscribe to such a fund, and we ask them to do so.

The Liberals are today fighting in the House of Commons for free speech and the people's liberties. We do not know how soon they may be called upon to struggle for their rights at the polls.

We must be ready. The Liberal party must be ready and the only way to be prepared is to organize.

In asking the financial assistance of Liberals, for that purpose we are inviting every member of the party to co-operate and stand shoulder to shoulder with us in this memorable struggle. We neither expect nor desire assistance from the trusts, or wealthy corporations, whose interests may clash with the interests of the common people, and this appeal is therefore made to the masses of the electorate, who desire to maintain the rights of the people. It is far more desirable in the interest of the party that the subscriptions should be general, coming from every parish in the province, in other words, that there should be a large number of subscribers for small amounts rather than a small number of subscribers for large amounts.

Subscriptions for any amount from one dollar and upwards will be received by those in the different polling districts in the parishes who are authorized to do so, as well as by the County Treasurers, who will forward all amounts they receive directly, as well as those from parish collectors, to the Provincial Treasurer who will acknowledge the same.

The funds collected will be expended under the direction of the undersigned Provincial Committee representing the Liberal members from New Brunswick in the House of Commons and subject to the audit of Henry E. Hill, of St. Stephen.

J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REVIEW

Adverse developments of the week have demonstrated one hopeful feature, at least on the surface, that the stock market is pretty thoroughly liquidated and that prevailing prices are at or near a discounting level. Outside of this particular feature, there is nothing very tangible on which to build up an optimistic viewpoint. Money the world over continues scarce, loaners are timid, and indigestion is still the prevailing trouble in underwriting circles.

Liquidation has been severe in all quarters with the exception of commodities, and labor. Tight money will probably force liquidation in the former, and tariff revision, coupled with tight money and an inevitable slowing down of business must eventually effect the latter. This creates the most delicate situation probably of all. Liquidation of wages will meet with strenuous opposition, and unfortunate as it may be this may have to be preceded by liquidation of men and an increase of supply of labor over demand before the solution of this problem can be worked out satisfactorily. It is therefore, assuming too much to say that all our troubles are behind us, but, as usual, stock values have anticipated far in advance developments which now obtain.

As the dangers which have been so well defined are now pretty generally appreciated and understood, the world over, it is quite possible that a slow improvements may now be anticipated.

We believe that the market will from now on be more susceptible and responsive to any good news than to further unfavorable influences and the investor should take advantage of present levels to pick up the tried

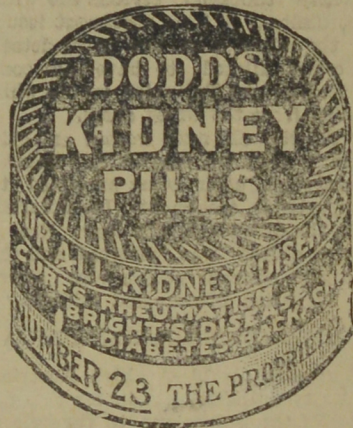
and tested stocks.

MONTREAL MARKET

There has been no change, either for better or worse, in the Montreal market during the past week. A little investment buying has been going on but a very little speculation and there does not seem to be any relief in sight for the immediate future. Conditions are not yet right for a substantial upward movement and Canadian stocks are in somewhat the same position as those on the New York board, in this respect, that any buying or selling movement of any magnitude would find a ready response, either upward or downward.

To the experienced trader this is a grand opportunity to pick up stocks which will certainly show substantial advances; to the inexperienced ones who are still wondering what to do, the situation may perhaps appear rather complex, and we do not say that the market is at the bottom, but it is certainly a better time to buy now than we have seen for some time, if values count for anything. Some of the common stocks listed in Montreal are at present paying 10 per cent. and in the case of Macdonald which recently sold at 40, twelve per cent. on the investment. The Macdonald Com-
