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## THEREAFTER COCHRANE

The incompetency and pig headedness of Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways, is proving a great vote getter for the Liberal cause. Tory politicians and newspapers and Boards of Trade in many places in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick which he has visited are sore on him. They regard him as too autocratic and high strung for the job and have strongly advised Premier Borden to get rid of him at the first opportunity. The labor unions of the country are now getting after the erratic Minister of Railways and are crying out for his dismissal. At St. John a few nights ago local Union No. 919 of the United Carpenters and Joiners met and passed the following resolution.

"Resolved that the local union endorse the action taken by our brother members in Ontario asking for the recall of Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways. Be it further

"Resolved, That this local union is opposed to the present method of carrying on work in the building trades around the I.C.R. terminals in this city. Be it further

"Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be presented to the press."

The Brantford, Ont., Union of the same organization recently adopted the following:

"Whereas, The efforts of our organization having so far proved ineffective in having the wages of the government employes in the gate yards of the Welland Canal raised to the standard of the district,

"And, Whereas the same reflects upon the honesty of the dominion government who prefer to enforce their wage conditions on all work and supplies; be it

"Resolved, That we, the Ontario Provincial Conference assembled at Brantford, representing over 2,000 carpenters' call upon the premier to remove from his position the Hon. Frank Cochrane, and appoint a man as minister of railways and canals who will act in harmony with this policy of the government and in sympathy with the workmen;

"And that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the premier and to the press."

The friends of Mr. J. K. Pinder, M. P. P., unhesitatingly declare that in the event of the Federal seat for York becoming vacant in the near future, that he is going to be the man for Ottawa. They point to the fact that the old Mackawick war horse was fighting the battles of his party in this country, when H. F. McLeod and his satellites were in swaddling clothes. It is also pointed out that the old gentleman in spite of obstacles placed in his way by men from who he deserved better treatment has done very good work as a local member; in fact they declare he is the only one of the bunch who has done anything at all. While a strong party man Mr. Pinder has conducted himself as a representative in such a manner as to win the good opinion of many Liberals, and they would be glad to see him get the promotion which he has earned by long and faithful service to the cause of Toryism.

Col. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia is a speech at the Halifax garrison dinner lectured the officers of the permanent force for idleness and neglect of their duties. He practically told them that the country did not want men who desired to spend their time in idleness, profligacy and society gaiety. Col. Sam seems to be well in touch with public opinion. Officers who spend their time playing tennis, or lallygagging about the square are certainly not much of an asset to the country. The only wonder is that this sort of tomfoolery has been tolerated so long.

Discussion on the Underwood tariff bill will begin in the United States Senate on Wednesday next. The bill will pass the senate by a small majority.

The transportation committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade seems to have put one over on the C.P.R. in the matter of freight rates. The unfair discrimination which the importers of this city have had to contend with for years is to be removed. The city had a good case and would have won out had it gone to the railway commission. The officials of the big corporation knew this, hence their eleventh hour repentance. Now we have the announcement that an official is to be sent here to discuss the question of passenger rates.

A Woodstock despatch says that Mr. F. B. Carvell, M. P., has donated \$20 to the Summer School of Science as a scholarship and that Premier Fleming has donated \$10 to the organization. The premier shines as a wind merchant, but when it comes to delivering the goods the sturdy Liberal warrior who looks after Carleton's interests in the House if Commons has him trimmed by a two to one shot.

Commodore Stewart is appealing to Hon. J. D. Hazen to step in and prevent Minister Cochrane from tearing up the rails of the Chelmsford section of the I. R. C. The Commodore might as well save his wind. The weak-kneed and back boneless leader could do nothing if he would and would do nothing if he could.

If Mr. O. S. Crockett goes to the Supreme Court bench he has it all arranged that his successor shall be Mr. Pinder. If Mr. McLeod is elected to the Ottawa seat he has it all arranged that Ex-Ald. Guthrie shall step into the local seat. There is a large sized "if" in both cases.

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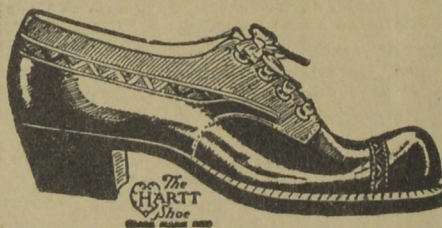
