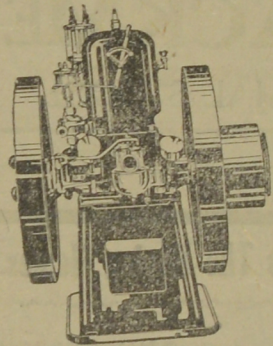

Both McPhee and Phinney were hit hard, while the home team could do little with Woodcock, a new recruit. Although twelve singles were registered off him he let up after the third when Ganley and his Pets had an eleven-run lead. In the first, Keaney was an easy out. Ganley tripled and Duggan doubled, followed by a single and a home run, and two more singles gave them four runs. It was the end of McPhee. He was taken away and Phinney was sent in. St. John, July 14—A large crowd of fans turned out on Saturday afternoon to the game between the Marathons and St. Croix on the local grounds, and were treated to a weird

exhibition of the popular pastime. The locals scored seven runs, and St. Croix sent three across. Charles pitched for the Greeks, showing form at all stages, and his good work was the one redeeming feature of an otherwise farcical contest of salaried baseball teams.

Conley was on the mound for the visitors and the big heater did not appear to exert himself to any marked extent, and despite this, he was singularly effective after the Greeks had secured a lead. Several of the players were injured during the affair; McPherson suffered a strain in the first of the sixth, and after attempting to play the field in the last half of the inning, was forced to retire, and Watt was badly battered by foul tips, on one occasion receiving a severe blow on the ankle.

O'Brien played good ball at times, but he hogged the territory between third and second, and once made a bad break on an easy out that short could have handled.

Ramsay, Pinkerton and Charles batted well, and Jinkerton did good work in the field, while Ramsay after missing a bounder, accepted two difficult chances in style.

St. Croix did not work hard during the first four innings, when the regular lineup was in the game, and the Greeks had no difficulty in running the bases for seven scores on ten safe hits; but during the remaining innings, Conley, supported by a weakened defense, held the locals to two singles.

St. Croix touched Charles for two clean singles and two scotch hits in the sixth, and three runs were made when the Greeks failed to support Charles in the pinch.
