UNION STATION
IS NOW NEARER
BECOMING REALITY

Intercolonial Said To be Ready to Build It and C. P. R. Regards it More Favorably—New Freight Sheds Expected

A union station for Fredericton is now said to be much nearer becoming a reality than it has been for some time. General Manager Gutelius of the Intercolonial Railway while in the city Saturday conferring with the officials of the St. John & Quebec Railway stated that a station for the joint use of the Intercolonial and Valley Railways would be constructed in Fredericton and it is now understood that Mr. Gutelius has conferred with the C.P.R. authorities on the subject of a union station and received information that the C.P.R. was rather favorably disposed toward the project. It is said that a sum in the neighborhood of \$60,000 is to be spent on such a structure the I.C.R. building it and the St. John & Quebec Railway to pay its share of the cost of construction and an arrangement to be made later with the C.P.R. for payment for use.

NEW FREIGHT SHEDS

It is announced that new freight sheds so situated that they can be used by both Intercolonial and St. John & Quebec Railways will be built in the near future. Their construction will be undertaken by the I.R.C. according to Mr. Gutelius and primarily will be for the purpose of meeting strong demand for the better

HEAVIEST RAIN
OF SUMMER FELL
DURING SUNDAY

In Two Showers 1.1 Inches of Rain Was Recorded—Gale of Wind Blew Logs and Rafts Adrift—Hail With Storm

The heaviest rain of the summer was recorded yesterday at the Meteorological station of the University of New Brunswick. There were two showers one beginning shortly after 2 p.m. and the other shortly after 6 p.m. In the first half an inch of rain fell and in the second six-tenths of an inch. Hail accompanied the storm which was one of the heaviest thunderstorms that has occurred here this summer. No great damage to crops was done however.

RAFTS WENT ADRIFT

There was a high wind during both storms. At the meteorological station a wind velocity of twenty miles per hour was recorded. This is not an extremely strong wind but was of sufficient violence to do considerable damage on the river. A number of rafts under the charge of D. D. Glasier & Son which were moored at The Flats and in the vicinity of Victoria Mills were torn loose and drifted down river. At the Mitchell Boom a similar thing happened and some damage was done the boom. The lumber was all caught after the storm and the damage repaired without much trouble.

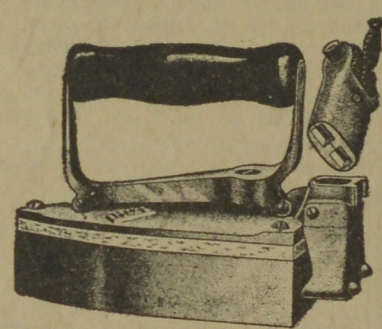

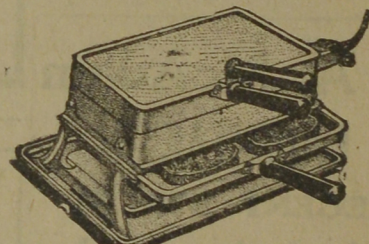
