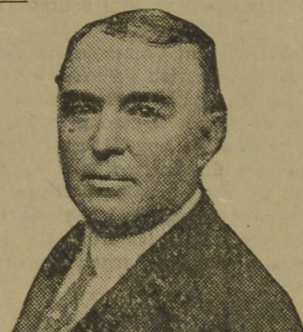

CANADA WILL CONTINUE TO GROW

Montreal, Jan. 16—For the next two years at least Canada from a personal study and perusal of the general business outlook will, I confidently believe, enjoy uninterrupted prosperity and I look for a very great expansion in all departments of trade and commerce.

This was the interesting announcement made by Mr. D. Lorne McGibbon to the Witness this morning when asked his opinion of the probable trend of stock market values based upon actual conditions.

"The present trouble in the Near East," continued Mr. McGibbon has naturally had a more or less depressing effect upon the markets of the world, but with this unfortunate trouble at an end I think that the markets would make an appreciable advance."

"Money always plays a part in business as well as stock market transactions. This is mostly seen during a period of what is termed tight money' or in other words, when rates are high. Just now the market presents, in my opinion, an opportunity for the purchase of several well known preferred stocks, which are paying a comfortable return to the investor and must, sooner or later sell above their present levels."

Would you care to particularize as regards these stocks? Mr. McGibbon was asked.

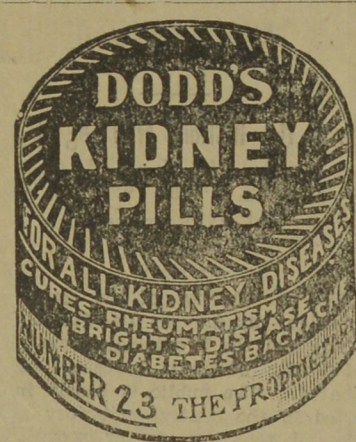
"I think that inadvisable, for a close observer of the tape should not take long to discern what are good investments."

Reverting to our prosperity Mr. McGibbon emphasized the point that it was advisable to maintain an equilibrium, and that with careful and judicious management our industries as well as mercantile concerns should enjoy a long period of continued growth. To enumerate the many large evidences of our rapid growth, with their guarantees for the future stability of Canada would be an interminable task, but one need only look around for assurance."

EARL GREY DEPENDS THE LAURIER POLICY

London, Jan. 15—The London Times of this morning publishes a letter from Earl Grey, in which he takes exception to the way in which, Mr. Austen Chamberlain referred to Canadian affairs in his speech on Monday night.

"I desire to protest," says Earl Grey, "against the assumption that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy of reciprocal free trade in certain natural products between Canada and the United States showed any want of imperial spirit on his part. On the contrary, it was the belief of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues that the free entry of the products of Canadian farms, fisheries and forests into a protected market of over ninety million people would add greatly to the wealth of Canada, and thus create an increased market for the protected manufactures of Canada and the United Kingdom that caused them to favor the policy of reciprocity. It is possible, I may go further and say it is not improbable, that had this policy been accepted by the people of Canada, British preference would be further increased."

"As one of those whose desire is to secure the nearest possible approximation to inter-imperial free trade: that the revenue requirements and the national necessities of each self-governing unit of the empire will permit, I am inclined to agree with those who believe that the adoption of the reciprocity proposals might have brought about a nearer approximation of that ideal, inter-imperial free trade, which is so dear to the heart of Mr. Austen Chamberlain. No, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy was conceived in any anti-imperial spirit, but the speeches of President Taft and others alarmed the Canadians as to the character of American ambitions, and no doubt had much influence in causing the Canadian people to reject the proposals of Canadian statesmen who are just as prepared as Mr. Chamberlain himself to spend their last dollar and sweat their last drop of blood in any struggles for the empire."

SIR FREDERICK BORDEN CONDEMS NAVAL POLICY

purpose of enabling the British Government to gather quickly such information as it may desire about defence matters. Anybody can be summoned to it.

All the Canadian ministers going to London have been invited to it, and what is more colonial membership of that committee was formally ratified by resolution at the Imperial Conference in London in 1911, at which Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. Brodeur and myself were present.

"Yet Mr. Borden comes forward and claims he has secured Canada membership to that committee. As a matter of fact he does this simply to cover up the defeat he experienced when he claimed participation in the foreign policy of Great Britain—a thing which can't be granted so long as the British Government is responsible through Parliament to the people of the United Kingdom for what it does. If you will read Mr. Harcourt's despatch to Canada on the subject of membership of this Defence Committee in the light of what I had told you, you will see that Mr. Borden's boasted advantage amounts to nothing."

IMPLORED ADMIRALTY TO FIND EMERGENCY

On the question of emergency, Sir Frederick said there was not a word in the Admiralty memorandum read by Mr. Balfour which would warrant him in saying that an emergency existed. The only possible excuse Mr. Borden could put up for a temporary policy instead of a permanent one was to claim that there was an emergency in Great Britain, and apparently he had employed the Admiralty to find one. What was the result? The result was a little note at the end of the Admiralty memorandum saying in effect that being pressed by Mr. Borden who asked what would be the best thing to do if immediate help or assistance were given, they would advise—and so on. You see the point—a political exigency in Canada made it necessary that an emergency calling for immediate help should be found in England, and that being so, the question was not what would be the best permanent policy and the best for the Empire, but what would be the best thing to do with a contribution that was not wanted by England.

The City of Fredericton will present at the approaching Session of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick the following bills for enactment:

(1) A Bill authorizing the City to grant certain concessions to the Palmer-McLellan Company, Limited, and to fix the valuation of the property of Frasers Limited in this City for taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue of Debentures for the erection of a Fire Station, a Police Station, for the purchase of Queen's Park and for the further construction of Permanent Street Pavements, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000).

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting by electricity the Fredericton and St. Mary's Highway Bridge.
